#### Dear RoAnn:

I am writing about a change in the New York State voting law I would like to see enacted. I realize the Legislature is not in session; however I hope the matter can be addressed in the fall session.

I have a daughter-in-law who is a 2<sup>nd</sup> Lt. in the U.S. Army stationed in Afghanistan. She, along with thousands of American soldiers, votes via absentee ballot. These fine Americans have the opportunity to vote, but as we are aware, many times their ballots do not arrive at local boards in time to be counted. Our local Board of Elections does a great job getting these ballots out on time; however the Board follows state law for the mailing time and they must count the ballots as written in the N.Y. State election law. Many of the troops are in war zones or may be out on patrols, preventing them from getting ballots in on time. Some civilian government employees have the same problem. I would like to see an early balloting period for Military and civilian employees working outside the United States.

The State does not allow for early balloting at this time and I believe it is tie to consider doing so. My suggestion is to allow for an earlier mailing of absentee applications for persons outside the state and an earlier return date. Disclaimers would be needed noting that candidates may change due to death or other circumstances before the election to protect the state from any legal action.

I am sending this request along with a copy of a Memorializing Petition to you, Governor Paterson, and other state representatives of Oneida County in the hope that you will take the imitative in this cause.

I hope you will consider this proposal and thank you in advance for any action you decide to take.

- RE: MEMORIALIZING PETITION CALLING UPON STATE LEGISLATORS TO SPONSOR A BILL TO AMEND NY STATE ELECTION LAW SO THAT IT ALLOWS FOR EARLY BALLOTING FOR PERSONS OUTSIDE THE UNITED SATES.
- WHEREAS, There are currently several thousand American military personnel, as well as other governmental employees, stationed outside the United States, and
- WHEREAS, Several of the absentee ballots cast by persons stationed overseas have failed to arrive in time because the voters were stationed in outposts that did not allow for prompt and efficient delivery of those ballots, and therefore said ballots have not been counted in federal, state, and local elections, and
- WHEREAS, In taking the above into consideration, other states have provided for early balloting to ensure that their citizens have been able to exercise their right to vote, and
- WHEREAS, The Election Laws of the State of New York make no provision, except for the same time-sensitive methods covered by absentee ballots for those residing within the United States, to facilitate the exercise of voting for those whose lives are endangered while in the act of protecting the rights and privileges guaranteed by the Constitution of the United States, including the right to cast a ballot, and
- WHEREAS, It is only fair and just that said persons be offered an opportunity to cast ballots that have a greater chance to be counted, now therefore be it
- RESOLVED, That the Oneida County Board of Legislators calls upon locally elected State Legislators to initiate and support an amendment to N.Y. State Election Law that allows for early balloting by persons stationed outside the State of New York and/or outside the borders of the United States, and it is further
- RESOLVED, That the Clerk of this Board of Legislators of Oneida County shall transmit copies of this memorializing petition to New York State Governor David A. Paterson, Assembly Representatives RoAnn M. Destito (D-116), David R. Townsend (R-115), and William Magee (D-111), New York State Senators Joseph A. Griffo (R-47) and David Valesky (D-49), New York State Assembly Speaker Sheldon Silver, and New York State Majority Leader Malcom Smith.

#### Dear WMS and CNS Coordinators:

The New York State Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance will be utilizing WMS to issue a Back to School benefit to all TA and FS cases with children ages 3 through 17. Each case will receive a one-time payment which is equal to \$200.00 for each active or sanctioned child in a TA or FS case active anytime in the month of July 2009. There will be no local share costs at all for the Back to School Benefit. A policy GIS outlining the details of the Back to School Benefit will be issued on August 6, 2009. A press event will be held on August 11, 2009 publicly announcing the Back to School benefit, and all communications should be kept internal until that date.

The Back to School Mass Authorization is tentatively scheduled to run on the weekend of 08/01/09-08/02/09. Any local district transactions performed on that weekend will pend until Batch Update on Monday, August 03, 2009. Attached for your review is Attachment A which provides information about WMS case processing for eligible cases and procedures for resolving exceptions, listings of which are scheduled to become available August 10, 2009.

A WMS GIS will be sent on 08/10/09, notifying districts of the file names of the Eligible and Exception lists. A letter template, in pdf format, will also be sent, which districts must use without changes to notify those exception cases that districts must authorize manually. OTDA will send a laser letter, dated August 11, 2009, which will be mailed on 08/11/09 or thereafter, to all cases identified on the Eligible List.

Workers should also be made aware of a new Payment Type N4 (Back to School). The mnemonic for this is BK-2-SCH. Description and use of this code is detailed in Attachment B.



As we continue to put together our budget for 2010, it is imperative that we examine new methods to cut back expenses and increase revenues. One such method that has been developed is an Early Retirement Incentive for Oneida County employees. The conditions would be as follows:

- Each employee meeting the eligibility standards and requirements for retirement provided for by the New York State Retirement System shall receive a single lump sum payment of ten thousand dollars upon their retirement from service with the County of Oneida within forty-five days of the effective date of their retirement.
- If fifty or more employees elect to accept the early retirement incentive option, the single lump sum payment will be increased to fifteen thousand dollars per employee upon their retirement.
- If one hundred employees or more elect to accept the early retirement incentive option, the single lump sum payment will be increased to twenty thousand dollars per employee upon their retirement.
- Such eligible employee must, no later than September 30, 2009, submit a letter to the Director of Personnel stating their intention to apply for and retire on or before December 31, 2009, which letter shall, on October 1, 2009, constitute an

irrevocable letter of resignation for the purpose of retirement and thereafter, such eligible employee must retire on or before December 31, 2009.

The conditions for an employee to be eligible are as follows:

- An employee must meet all eligibility requirements for retirement as provided by the New York State Retirement System; and must have a minimum of ten years continuous employment with the County.

I strongly believe that this plan offers the opportunity to examine all the vacated jobs for their validity and effectiveness and therefore, will aid in the elimination of jobs and offer a greater savings for the County. As such, whatever the total number of employees retiring under this incentive, I will pledge to cut the County workforce by fifty percent of that number.
