Client Population/Number to be served:

• In FY2007 (142) adult individuals convicted of misdemeanors, felonies and violation of probation were supervised with electronic monitoring. The minimal "target" set by NYS DPCA was one hundred for that time frame. During the year (115) successfully completed programming and only (27) were returned to court and incarcerated and (31) cases were carried into FY2008. Total days served on Domicile Restriction in 2007 was 12,130 x (\$85 p/day jail cost) = \$1,031,050.00 in county savings not including revenue gained from boarding in inmates from other jurisdictions in these individual spots.

• In FY2008 numbers closely resemble those of FY2007. By years' end we will have served over 140 clients on Domicile Restriction for a savings of over 12,100 days and well over \$1,000,000. As of December 1, 65 defendants were employed full time, 20 part time, and 10 were students.

Contract terms:

FY2009 is the fourth year of a (5) year fixed contract of \$305,000 to be paid to Oneida County by N.Y.S. DPCA in yearly increments of \$61,000 beginning in FY 2006. However, due to across the board state cuts our reimbursement was reduced to \$56,200.00. Contract based on Probation yearly receiving \$197.23 per new clients served and \$2,077.17 for each client that satisfactorily completes the program up to a total of \$61,000.00. Due to the programs success over the years in keeping non-violent offenders working in the community and not as reliant on Public Assistance the Oneida County Department of Social Services provides an additional \$35,000 p/year in revenue to the program to assist in costs not covered by NYS DPCA funding.

Additional information:

Domicile Restriction is the backbone of the Oneida County Probation's (ATI) – Alternative to Incarceration Program. There are (40) EM units for adult offenders as included in attached contract. Based on the ATI program success (15) additional units are administered from the 3141 Cost Center to use as alternatives to detention of juveniles before Family Court. OCDSS also funds an additional (10) electronic monitoring units in cost center 3140 solely to reduce PINS detentions and placements. Recently, the county has entered into an agreement to lease (5) GPS tracking units for sex offenders through the Domicile Restriction Cost Center 3141.

Therefore, I, David a. Tomidy - Acting Director of Probation hereby recommend that the Oneida County Executive and Oneida County Board of Legislators approve the attached contract for state reimbursement for Domicile Restriction

I am requesting the addition of the title, Exam Monitor, to Oneida County's Classification Plan. Attached is the draft job description.

It has recently come to my attention that an exam monitor job description was never adopted for Oneida County Civil Service. The job of monitoring examinations is occasional, sporadic and part-time. The exam monitors voluntarily work the days of their choice of any one or more of the seventeen Saturdays on which Civil Service examinations are scheduled by the State Department of Civil Service. Since all new titles are by law Competitive titles, the department will be forwarding a request to New York State Civil Service Commission to amend Oneida County's Rules and to classify Exam Monitor as Non-competitive. The exam monitors are paid a rate of \$10.00 per hour. The 2009 Budget supports the payment to exam monitors with no additional county dollars.

If you concur, I respectfully request the Board of Legislators' approval to add Exam Monitor to Oneida County's Classification Plan.

EXAM MONITOR

<u>DISTINGUISHING FEATURES OF THE CLASS:</u> This is part-time work involving the responsibility for monitoring Civil Service examinations on an occasional or sporadic basis in accordance with established procedures. An incumbent in this class assists in assuring the overall security of the examination process and provides, within established guidelines, information and assistance to candidates. Work is performed under the direct supervision of a staff member of Oneida County Department of Personnel or other person designated Monitor in Charge. Supervision over the work of others is not a function of this class. The Exam Monitor performs related work as required.

TYPICAL WORK ACTIVITIES: (Illustrative Only)

Provides information and assistance to candidates in accordance with established policies and procedures;

Checks admission notices, reviews photo identification, notes attendance on roll call list and directs candidates to a seat;

Counts, distributes, collects and sorts all testing materials and forms in accordance with established policies and procedures;

Moves quietly throughout the room to monitor candidates for cheating and use of contraband reference materials;

Reviews all candidates' exam materials when candidates have completed their examination(s), carefully verifying that all test materials are in order and have been handed in;

When required, accurately completes and signs checklists, verification sheets, critical incident reports, substitute candidate ID forms, state review sheets, and vouchers or time sheets;

Escorts candidates to restrooms as necessary.

Monitor in Charge only:

Brings secured testing materials to testing site;

Makes general announcements, gives examination instructions and distributes examination materials to Exam Monitors;

Oversees and directs assigned work of Exam Monitors;

Ensures that all established testing and security procedures are followed;

Maintains order;

Reviews and collects organized examination materials from Exam Monitors for return to the Oneida County Department of Personnel's secured storage area;

Reviews, and signs when indicated, completed checklists, verification sheets, critical incident reports, substitute candidate ID forms, State review sheets, and vouchers or time sheets:

Reports testing day outcomes to the Head Monitor.

I am submitting the following Purchase of Services Agreement for review and approval by the Board of Legislators per Board Resolutions and Local Law #3 of 2001, amending Article VIII, Section 802 of the Administrative Code.

The Oneida County PINS Adjustment Services Program is an intervention and treatment program coordinated by the Oneida County Department of Social Services and Probation Department. It is designed to divert from Family Court and Institutional placement those youth who are at serious risk of being taken to Family Court as a Person in Need of Supervision (PINS) because they have been persistently incorrigible and / or truant. If the Probation Department determines that the case is eligible for Adjustment Services, then a complete psycho-social assessment with related referrals and evaluation of families and youth is conducted by the Oneida County Mental Health Department. The Committee on Appropriate Placement (CAP) will recommend an appropriate service plan. The possible services can run from probation supervision to intensive family intervention and can also include Counseling, Mental Health, Parenting, Medical, Substance Abuse, Education and Recreation Services. This Contract covers the PINS 16-18 Project.

The Oneida County Probation Department is an integral part of the PINS process and this segment of the system helps to ensure that appropriate family needs are addressed before the situation further escalates and out of home placement can no longer be avoided.

The Oneida County Probation component of the PINS Adjustment Services per the attached Purchase of Services Agreement will operate from January 1, 2009 through December 31, 2009 with an annual budget of \$345,847 with a local cost of 11% or \$38,043.

1). Narrative Description of Proposed Services

The Contractor will provide alternative planning for families eligible for diversion services and provide evaluative data for the Department on the operation of the entire PINS Process in order to utilize appropriate Preventive Services on the areas which are most likely to prevent Foster Care.

The Contractor agrees that the Probation Officers will perform the following functions:

- 1. Provide liaison, consultation, and training to all Oneida County Schools to facilitate appropriate use of PINS Services.
- 2. Screen and evaluate all PINS referrals to determine suitability. To include verification that the school has made efforts through other resources to resolve the complaint prior to initiating a Pre-PINS applications with probation
- 3. Participation in the planning for Preventive Services through either:
 - a.) the use of the Committee on appropriate placement for youth at high risk of out of home care and implementation of CAP recommendation in order to utilize DSS Preventive Contracts.
 - b.) Provide continued monitoring of youth and family functioning.
- 4. Active Participation in the Oneida County CAP Committee.
- 5. Compile statistics to monitor the functioning of the Oneida County PINS Plan.
- 6. Complete and supply program evaluation data as requested by the Department. The contractor agrees to prepare and provide any and all monthly reports required by the County and State Governments pertaining to this contract.

The Contractor and the Department shall cooperate with the County's CAP System and will work together to make appropriate changes in the PINS adjustment services as indicated.

Enclosed is a Third Amendment to Lease Agreement that would be retroactive to September 1, 2008 and end on August 31, 2011. This amendment would allow Daimler's continued occupancy of approximately 145,306 square feet of office, manufacturing, and storage space. In addition, Daimler would be allowed to reduce this occupancy by approximately 21,317 square feet at their discretion.

Total monthly rent payments from Daimler would initially be \$34,247.55, less any capital improvement credits, and would be reduced accordingly if occupancy were reduced.

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

THIRD AMENDMENT TO LEASE AGREEMENT

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the County and Daimler Bus, formerly known as Orion Bus Industries, Inc., entered into a lease agreement dated August 14, 2002 ("Original Lease"), Amendment to Lease dated May 30, 2003 ("First Amendment") and Amendment to Lease dated July 14, 2004 ("Second Amendment") and

WHEREAS, the County and Daimler Bus now wish to further amend the terms of the Original Lease and such First and Second Amendment by a Third Amendment thereto, as set forth herein

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises, the parties hereto agree as follows:

1. The term "Demised Premises", as previously defined, shall be amended to include all of those shaded areas identified as "Lease Space" on Exhibit "A" to this amendment to lease agreement, which exhibit is attached herewith and made a part hereof this agreement, such areas containing 116,298 sq. ft. of space on the first, second and third floors of the Building identified as Building 13 located on Base Road in Oriskany, New York, to be apportioned as follows:

2.

BUILDING 13

First Floor 95,083 sq. ft.
Second Floor 4,951 sq. ft.
Third Floor 16,264 sq. ft.
Warehouse 7,691 sq. ft.

Total 123,989 sq. ft.

Daimler Bus shall also be responsible for the monthly rental amount of \$3.28 per square foot for additional space occupied by Daimler Bus in Building 13 and the Warehouse Annex identified as "Occupied Space in Addition to Lease Space" on Exhibit "A" herein, which space is comprised of as follows:

BUILDING 13

First Floor 9,219 sq. ft. Second Floor 12,098 sq. ft.

Total 21,317 sq. ft.

In addition, Daimler Bus shall lease from the County 288,972 sq. ft. of Ramp Space at \$.05 per square foot, which Daimler Bus shall use for the parking of its buses as depicted on Exhibit "B", attached herewith and made a part hereof this lease amendment. Daimler Bus shall also be permitted to use 12 of the 17 reserved front parking spaces located on

Base Road and Daimler Bus shall be given access to the parking lot located on the east side of Base Road for employee parking only.

Collectively such lease, occupied and ramp space shall comprise the "Demised Premises"

- 3. The lease term set forth in the Original Lease shall be and is amended to provide Daimler Bus with a lease term which shall commence on September 1, 2008 and shall end on August 31, 2011. The parties may agree in writing to renew this lease agreement for one (1) additional term of three (3) years and a monthly rental amount not to exceed \$3.50 per square foot.
- 4. Daimler Bus agrees to make all the necessary improvements, at Daimler Bus' sole expense, to render the Demised Space suitable to meet their needs as office and research and development prototype production space.
- 5. The County acknowledges that Daimler Bus has made modifications to the airfield fencing pursuant to standards and dimensions required by the County. Upon expiration or the earlier termination of the lease term herein, Daimler Bus shall, at the County's option and at the County's request, return the airfield fencing to such location and condition as existed prior to the modification mentioned above.
- 6. The County has permitted Daimler Bus to construct, at Daimler Bus' sole expense, an appropriate door mechanism for the entry of transit buses to the main hangar facility without the necessity of opening the main hangar doors located on the south side of Building 13. Daimler Bus agrees that, upon its vacating the facility, either by termination or expiration of the lease, the main hangar door shall be returned to a good and operable condition, which condition shall be determined by the County.
- 7. The County shall permit Daimler Bus to, at Daimler Bus' sole expense, make certain modifications to the sliding doors located on the north side of Building 13, to wit: bolting the sliding doors shut and installing two (2) overhead doors into the sliding doors. Any modification to the doors shall be in conformance with all state and local standards and guidelines for such modifications to an existing structure. Upon expiration or the earlier termination of the lease term herein, Daimler Bus shall, at the County's option and at the County's request, return the north side sliding doors to such condition and working order as existed prior to the modification mentioned above.
- 8. Daimler Bus agrees to provide to the County, plans and specifications for review prior to any improvements or site changes being commenced. The County shall provide comments and approval of any proposed building alterations within ten (10) days of receipt of the plans and specifications, which must be stamped and signed by an architect or engineer licensed to practice in the State of New York.
- 9. The rent amount set forth in the Original Lease and as modified in the Second Amendment shall be further amended herein as follows: Daimler Bus shall pay to the County the total rent amount for the lease space, occupied space in addition to lease space, and ramp space, calculated as follows: Four Hundred Ninety One Thousand Fifty Two and 28/100 Dollars (\$491,052.28) per annum [(123,989 sq. ft (lease) + 21,317 sq. ft. (occupied) x \$3.28 per square foot) + (288,972 sq. ft (ramp space) x \$.05 per square

foot)] payable in equal monthly installments of Forty Thousand Nine Hundred Twenty One and 02/100 Dollars (\$40,921.02) less the following credits for utilities and maintenance:

- Utility credit based on space in Building 13 unoccupied by Daimler Bus -25,034 sq. ft. x \$2.40 = \$60,081.60 ÷ 12 = \$5,006.80 per month;
- Maintenance credit of \$1666.67 per month.

Total monthly rent payment from Daimler Bus shall be \$34,247.55.

In the event that additional hangar or office space becomes available in the hangar and Daimler Bus wishes to occupy the additional space therein, then the County shall consider leasing such additional space to Daimler Bus at a lease rate equal to that which is in effect and in accordance with the payment schedule set forth in the Original Lease and both amendments thereto.

Daimler Bus may elect to reduce the Demised Premises by reducing the square footage identified as the "Occupied Space in Addition to Lease Space" (29,008 sq. ft.) as shown on Exhibit "A" by electing to remove all Daimler Bus' items and persons presently using this space. Daimler Bus shall notify the County as to when and in what square footage amount Daimler Bus wishes to vacate the Occupied Space. County will conduct an inspection of the Occupied Space being vacated. Following such inspection, the County shall advise the County Department of Aviation of the adjustment in rental amount based on the vacating of all or part of the Occupied Space by Daimler Bus and the adjusted, revised billing shall be used for the next monthly payment to County. If Daimler Bus elects to reduce the Demised Premises then all Daimler Bus' rights to the space vacated by such deduction shall be extinguished.

10. Daimler Bus shall be responsible for the payment of electric, gas, sewer and water utilities servicing the Demised Space. The County shall provide Daimler Bus with a rent credit for such payments as set forth in Paragraph 9 above, which rent credit shall be apportioned according to the reconfigured square footage set forth in this Third Amendment to Lease.

The Warehouse Annex is not part of Building 13 and has separate utility meters. Therefore, the Warehouse Annex space shall be excluded from the rent credit calculations. In accordance with Paragraph 4 of the first Amendment to Lease Agreement, Daimler Bus shall be responsible for directly paying all utilities associated with the Warehouse Annex without County reimbursement. If utility accounts are not in Daimler Bus' name then Daimler Bus agrees to accept such accounts within four (4) weeks of execution of this agreement and shall reimburse County all utility expenses retroactive to September 1, 2008.

Daimler Bus shall be responsible for its telephone, data, internet and all other utilities servicing the Demised Space.

11. Daimler Bus shall be responsible for all expenses related to its use of the Demised Space including, but not limited to, pest control, waste removal, janitorial services and security for the Demised Space. Daimler Bus shall be responsible for all snow and ice removal in the leased ramp areas, the area adjacent to and around the Warehouse building, all designated and non-designated parking areas outside of the fence used by

Daimler Bus employees and invitees and all sidewalk areas leading to or from all designated or non-designated parking areas and Building 13.

During all seasons, Daimler Bus shall maintain, in a neat and orderly manner, the grounds located inside their fenced area and in front of the hangar, on the west side of Base Road, extending from the south end of the hangar facility to the driveway entering the north end of the hangar facility. Daimler Bus shall not be allowed to store any equipment, supplies or materials outside of the buildings located on the Demised Space.

Daimler Bus shall schedule and complete all electrical and lighting (bulb) replacements and preventative maintenance in the Demised Premises. Daimler Bus shall not be responsible for major breakdowns in the electrical system, including the ballast or any transformer replacements.

Daimler Bus shall provide day to day maintenance of the bathrooms located on the Demised Space including any cleaning and cosmetic work to same.

The County shall be responsible for all other maintenance items relating to the building, including but not limited to, heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems, roof, site drainage, all mechanical systems including compressed air, elevator, building fire alarm and fire suppression equipment, water and sewer.

- 12. Daimler Bus agrees to procure and maintain general liability insurance covering their use and occupancy of the Demised Space, business interruption insurance (if applicable) and coverage for the contents of the Demised Space. The County shall maintain the necessary insurance on the building structure. Daimler Bus shall add the County to its general liability insurance policy as an additional insured.
- 13. This Third Amendment to Lease shall be subject to FAA approval to release the Demised Space for non-aeronautical use and upon the approval of the respective governing boards/principals of the County and Daimler Bus, to wit: the Oneida County Board of Legislators and the designated Daimler Buses' executive officer. Daimler Bus agrees to occupy and use the Demised Space in compliance with the New York State fire and building codes.
- 14. Daimler Bus shall have the right to sublet the Warehouse space to a third party sublessee upon obtaining the County's prior written consent, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld, conditioned or delayed. Any sub-lease agreement with a third party for Warehouse space shall not relieve Daimler Bus of any of its obligations under the terms of this lease.
- 15. In all other respects, the terms and conditions set forth in the Original Lease and the First and Second Amendments to Lease, which have not been amended herein, shall remain in full force and effect.
- 16. Repair work that is the responsibility of the County under the terms of the Original Lease or any Amendment thereto may be undertaken by Daimler Bus and reimbursed by the County. Daimler Bus shall obtain written approval from the County prior to commencement of any repairs. The total cumulative cost of repairs undertaken by Daimler Bus on behalf the County shall not exceed twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) annually. Work that exceeds the cumulative \$20,000.00 threshold in any year shall be

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the responsibility of the County. Prior to reimbursement, the County shall inspect the repair and Daimler Bus shall provide proof of full payment for the work. If repairs are made as pre-approved and determined to be acceptable by the County, Daimler Bus shall deduct the cost from the next monthly rental payment. Failure to obtain written pre-approval from the County shall constitute a waiver of Daimler Bus' right to be compensated, in any way, for such repairs. Daimler Bus may also undertake repairs at its own expense that are not the responsibility of the County, but shall obtain written approval from the County prior to commencement of such work.

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
