It is necessary to execute an amendment to the agreement for the 2009 construction season. Additional compensation is required because of an unusually large number of projects and the geographic location of each project. The increased number of projects is due to several projects rolling-over from the 2008 construction season into the 2009 construction season. The geographic location of each project ranged throughout Northern Oneida County. This made it impossible for one team of inspectors to cover all projects. Projects completed to date and incomplete projects are as follows

Originally, the Department of Public Works and Lochner Engineering estimate that an additional \$110,000.00 would be required to provide construction inspection and project closeout services for the balance of 2009 on the following projects. On October 14, 2009, the Oneida County Board if Acquisition & Contract accepted a proposal from Lochner Engineering in this amount. Subsequently, the Department of Public Works and Lochner Engineering were able to reduce the estimate to \$90,000.00 by eliminating overtime, limiting work hours, and compressing several construction schedules.

Therefore, please consider the enclosed amendment for \$90,000.00 to provide construction inspection and project closeout services on County funded bridge and highway reconstruction projects for the balance of 2009. Funding would be provided through Capital Project H-374, County Highway Bridge Program (Phase 3).

If the amendment is acceptable, please forward to the Oneida County Board of Legislators for consideration.

Dear County Executive Picente,

Barton & Loguidice, P.C. of Syracuse was previously approved by the Oneida County Board of Legislators to provide preliminary engineering/design services and construction inspection services for Miscellaneous Repairs and Maintenance Painting of Multiple Bridges, for a not to exceed fee of \$273,000 (\$95,000 design, \$178,000 construction).

The original construction schedule called for 30 weeks of construction inspection. To date, Barton & Loguidice has expended 33.7 weeks of inspection time and it is estimated that an additional 3 weeks will be required to complete and close out all projects. Therefore, on September 30, 2009, the Oneida County Board of Acquisition & Contract accepted a proposal from Barton & Loguidice for \$29,000 (\$23,200.00 federal aid, \$4,350.00 State aid, \$1,450.00 County share) to provide additional construction inspection services as noted above. The revised contract total would be \$302,000.00 (\$241,600.00 federal aid, \$45,300 State aid, \$15,100 County share).

Please consider the enclosed Supplemental Agreement No. 2 for the services noted above. If the supplemental agreement is acceptable please forward to the Oneida County Board of Legislators for Consideration.

Dear County Executive Picente,

The Purchasing Department's success relating to E-bay has surpassed all expectations with anticipated revenues to increase for the third straight year. This success was mainly due to the letter you sent to local municipalities, including cities, towns, villages, school districts and non for profits inviting them to utilize our E-bay site to sell their surplus. We have received nothing but high marks from each one that we have worked with and we have and will continue to reach out beyond Oneida County, signing agreements with other counties and school districts.

In this tough economy I thought it was time to take a look at our fee structure in an effort to assist our partners. I propose that we lower our current percentage fees. Currently we receive:

- 20% for items selling for \$10,000.00
- 10% for everything over \$10,000.00

I'm asking that we reduce our fee as follows:

- Items sold under \$1,000.00 will be charged 20%
- Items sold over \$1,001.00 will be reduced to 10%.

Even with the reduction in fees I don't expect a loss in revenue because most of the items we sell are already under \$1,000.00. What I expect to see will be more items with a value over \$1,000.00 because of the lower percentage. This will most likely pick up more business from current partners and will most certainly add to our list of partners due to the lower fees.

I will make myself available to speak at any and all town, village, school, or executive board meeting promoting this shared service in an effort to retain and increase outside sales if you approve my proposal. I ask that you submit to the Board of Legislators this change in our fee structure reflecting the percentages listed above.

I. INTRODUCTION

Oneida County established January 1, 2009 – January 31, 2009 as the Open Enrollment Period for Agricultural Districts. A public hearing was held on March 3, 2008. This report reflects the recommendations of the Oneida County Farmland Protection Board.

II. DISCUSSION

A total of 10 landowners, owning 1003acres of farmland expressed a desire to be within an agricultural district by submitting an Agricultural District Enrollment Form to the Agricultural and Farmland Protection Board. These landowners, together with the specific parcels and acreages to be enrolled in the modified district, are shown on the attached list.

III. FINDINGS MADE BY THE ONEIDA COUNTY AGRICULTURAL AND FARMLAND PROTECTION BOARD

The Oneida County Agricultural and Farmland Protection Board reviewed all of the applications and parcels on an individual basis and found all of them to be in accordance with the qualifications for inclusion within an agricultural district.

IV. RECOMMENDATION

The Oneida County Agricultural and Farmland Protection Board recommends that the 10 landowners and 1003 acres of farmland shown on the attached list. I enclose herewith a letter from David C. Grow, Chairman of the Oneida County Industrial Development Agency ("OCIDA") requesting that the County Board of Legislators approve the formation of the "Oneida County Local Development Corporation" for the purpose of issuing tax-exempt bonds to refinance qualified projects that would typically be financed by tax-exempt Industrial Development bonds.

This request of the OCIDA is based on a recent State ruling which has resulted in a lack of viable, less costly financing alternatives for non-profit organizations such as colleges, universities and hospitals, etc.

While other counties have created Local Development Corporations ("LDC") to issue bonds to finance these non-profit initiatives in the first instance, the LDC proposed for Oneida County would only have the power to issue bonds, notes and other obligations to refinance or refund outstanding debt of these organizations. There will be no "new money" for non-profit projects to be financed by the LDC structure as proposed for Oneida County.

The OCIDA is requesting Board approval of the enclosed resolution at its November 25, 2009 regular session. I am certain that any questions the Board or its committees may have regarding this request for action can be addressed by Mr. Grow, OCIDA counsel

and the County Attorney. Please advise if you wish to have any of these parties present for committee or Board sessions.

On behalf of the Oneida County Industrial Development Agency, I am writing to request that the County Legislature approve the formation of the Oneida County Local Development Corporation for the purpose of issuing tax-exempt bonds to refinance qualified projects that would typically be financed by tax-exempt Industrial Development Agency bonds. The State Legislature's failure to reinstate the legislation that allows Industrial Development Agencies to finance "civic facility" projects (i.e., projects that are owned or occupied by non-profit organizations such as colleges, universities, hospitals, etc.) has created substantial hardship for non-profit institutions in Oneida County. Right now, the only viable tax-exempt financing alternative for these institutions is to seek financing from the Dormitory Authority, which is significantly more costly for these institutions and often results in more burdensome financing covenants.

Faced with the continuing inability Industrial Development Agencies to issue tax-exempt bonds for non-profit institutions, counties are now forming local development corporations ("LDC's") with the authority to issue tax-exempt bonds. For example, Madison County, Cattaraugus County and, most recently, Onondaga County have all created LDC's to issue tax-exempt bonds. The formation of these LDC's was prompted by an Internal Revenue Service private letter ruling issued last May, in which the IRS concluded that interest on bonds issued by the LDC described in that ruling will be tax-exempt. Enclosed for your information is a copy of this IRS ruling.

Our bond counsel, Bond, Schoeneck & King, has prepared the enclosed Certificate of Incorporation for the Oneida County LDC. Pursuant to the Certificate of Incorporation (which is based on the model approved by the IRS), the County will be the sole member of the LDC with the power to, among other things, approve the Corporation's certificate of incorporation and bylaws and all amendments thereto, and to appoint the Corporation's Board of Directors. To ensure proper coordination between the IDA and the LDC, the Certificate of Incorporation provides that the LDC's officers and directors will be the same as the officers and directors of the Oneida County IDA.

Unlike the other recently created LDC's, however, the Oneida County LDC will have the power to issue bonds, notes and other obligations only to refinance or refund outstanding debt. The Corporation will not have the power to issue obligations to provide initial financing or "new money" for any project. These limitations are stated in subparagraph (D) of paragraph "Twelfth" of the Certificate of Incorporation.

In order to move forward with the formation of the LDC, we ask that the Board of Legislators adopt the enclosed resolution at its November 25 meeting, approving the establishment of the LDC. This responds to your request for a ruling that bonds issued by the Corporation will be treated as issued on behalf of the County for purposes of § 103 of the Internal Revenue Code (the "Code").

FACTS AND REPRESENTATIONS

The County is a political subdivision of the State governed by an elected board of representatives (the "County's Board"). Agency is a public benefit corporation of the

State created pursuant to State Law 1. Agency is governed by members who are appointed by and serve, without compensation, at the pleasure of the County's Board.

Pursuant to State Law 2, the County caused the Corporation to be formed as a public instrumentality of the County and approved its certificate of incorporation. The Corporation is a not-for-profit local development corporation organized under State Law 2 to assist the County with carrying out the public purposes of relieving and reducing unemployment; promoting and providing for additional and maximum employment; bettering and maintaining job opportunities; instructing or training individuals to improve or develop their capabilities for such jobs; carrying on scientific research for the purpose of aiding the County by attracting new industry to the County, by encouraging the development of, or retention of, an industry in the County, and by lessening the burdens of government; and acting in the public interest.

Under State Law 2, in furtherance of its purposes, Corporation is empowered to construct, acquire, rehabilitate and improve for use by others industrial or manufacturing plants in the County, to assist financially in such construction, acquisition, rehabilitation and improvement, to maintain such plants for others in such territory, to disseminate information and furnish advice, technical assistance and liaison with Federal, State and local authorities with respect thereto, and to acquire by purchase, lease, gift, bequest, devise or otherwise real or personal property or interests therein, to borrow money and to issue negotiable bonds, notes and other obligations therefore, to sell, lease, mortgage or otherwise dispose of or encumber any such plants or any of its real or personal property or any interest therein upon such terms as it may determine. State Law 2 further provides that in carrying out such powers the Corporation will be performing an essential government function.

The County is the sole member of the Corporation. The County's Board appoints the Corporation's governing board of directors (the "Corporation's Board") from members of the Agency. The Corporation's Board serves, without compensation, at the pleasure of the County's Board. The Corporation is required to undergo annual independent audits and to submit those audits to the County and to the State, to prepare and submit its annual budget to the County and to the State, and to form governance and audit committees to ensure the Corporation is in compliance with State laws. The Corporation may not amend its by-laws or certificate of incorporation without the consent of the chairman of the County's Board. No part of the Corporation's net earnings will inure to the benefit of any private person. Upon dissolution, title to all property owned by the Corporation will vest in and become the property of the County.

Bonds issued by the Corporation will not be backed by the full faith and credit of the County, and thus will be non-recourse to the County. Bonds issued by the Corporation will be secured solely by the creditworthiness of a particular project. The County's Board will provide the public approval under § 147 for private activity bonds issued by

the Corporation that are intended to be tax-exempt for Federal income tax purposes under § 103 of the Code.

Pursuant to State Law 2 the income and operations of the Corporation are exempt from State taxation. Pursuant to State Law 3 interest on bonds that are tax-exempt for Federal income tax purposes is exempt from State income tax.

LAW AND ANALYSIS

Section 103(a) of the Code provides, in general, that gross income does not include interest on any state or local bond. Section 103(c)(1) defines a "state or local bond" for purposes of §§ 103, and 141 through 150, as an obligation of a state or political subdivision thereof. Section 1.103-1(a) of the Income Tax Regulations provides, in part, that interest upon obligations of a state, territory, a possession of the United States, the District of Columbia, or any political subdivision thereof (hereinafter collectively or individually called "state or local government unit") is not includable in gross income. Section 1.103-1(b) provides, in part, that an obligation issued by or on behalf of any state or local governmental unit by a constituted authority empowered to issue such an obligation is the obligation of such a unit.

Revenue Ruling 57-187, 1957-1 C.B. 65, holds that bonds issued by an industrial development board (the "entity") are considered issued on behalf of a political subdivision of the state under the following facts and circumstances: the entity is formed only after the governing body of the political subdivision has formally approved the entity's creation; the board of directors of the entity is elected by the governing body of the political subdivision and serves without compensation; the entity is empowered to issue bonds in furtherance of the purposes for which it is established; bonds issued by the entity are payable solely out of revenues and receipts derived from the leasing or sale by the entity of its projects; the political subdivision is not liable for the payment of principal or interest on any of the bonds of the entity; the entity is exempt from all state taxation, and interest on bonds issued by the entity is exempt from state taxes; the entity is a nonprofit organization and none of its net earnings inure to the benefit of any private person; and upon dissolution of the entity, title to all property it owns vests in and becomes the property of the political subdivision which creates it. Although this revenue ruling deals with an industrial development board, the analysis contained therein has been applied to a variety of governmental entities.

Comparing the facts of Rev. Rul. 57-187 to the facts as presented, we conclude that the Corporation qualifies as an "on behalf of" issuer of the County for purposes of § 1.103-1(b). The Corporation was formed as a public instrumentality of the County only after the County's Board formally approved its incorporation. The Corporation's Board is appointed by and serves at the pleasure of the County's Board. The Corporation is

empowered to issue bonds in furtherance of its purposes. Bonds issued by the Corporation will be nonrecourse to the County. The income and operations of the Corporation are exempt from State taxation under State Law 2. Pursuant to State Law 3, interest on federally tax-exempt bonds issued by the Corporation will be exempt from State income tax. The Corporation is a nonprofit corporation and no part of its net earnings will inure to the benefit of any private person. Upon dissolution of the Corporation, title to all property owned by it will vest in and become the property of the County.

CONCLUSION

Based on the foregoing, we conclude that bonds issued by the Corporation will be treated as issued on behalf of the County for purposes of § 103 of the Code.

This ruling is directed only to the taxpayer requesting it. Section 6110(k)(3) of the Code provides that it may not be used or cited as precedent. Except as expressly provided herein, no opinion is expressed or implied concerning the tax consequences of any aspect of any transaction or item discussed or referenced in this letter.

The rulings contained in this letter are based upon information and representations submitted by the taxpayer and accompanied by a penalty of perjury statement executed by an appropriate party. While this office has not verified any of the materials submitted in support of the request for rulings, it is subject to verification on examination.

CERTIFICATE OF INCORPORATION of ONEIDA COUNTY LOCAL DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION

A Not-For-Profit Local Development Corporation Under Section 402 and 1411 of the Not-For-Profit Corporation Law of the State of New York

THE UNDERSIGNED, being over the age of eighteen years, for the purpose of forming a not-for-profit local development corporation pursuant to Section 1411 of the Not For Profit Corporation Law of the State of New York (the "N-PCL"), hereby certifies as follows:

FIRST: The name of the corporation is Oneida County Local Development Corporation (hereinafter referred to as the "Corporation").

SECOND: The Corporation will be a corporation as defined in subparagraph (a)(5) of Section 102 of the N-PCL and, as provided in Section 1411 (b) of the N-PCL, will be a Type C Corporation as defined in Section 201 of the N-PCL. The Corporation is an public instrumentality of, but separate and apart from, Oneida County (the "County").

THIRD: The purpose for which the Corporation is to be formed and operated exclusively for charitable purposes within the meaning of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and for the specific purpose of:

- (a) promoting community and economic development and the creation of jobs in the non-profit and for-profit sectors for the citizens of the County by developing and providing programs for not-for-profit institutions, manufacturing and industrial businesses and other entities to access low interest tax-exempt and non-tax-exempt financing for their eligible projects; and
- (b) relieving and reducing unemployment in the County, bettering and maintaining job opportunities, carrying on scientific research for the purpose of aiding the County by attracting new industry to the County or by encouraging the development of, or retention of, an industry in the County, and lessening the burdens of government and acting in the public interest.

By means of engaging in the following activities:

- (a) issuing and selling one or more series or classes of bonds, notes and other obligations (the "Obligations") through public letting, private placement, or negotiated underwriting, to refinance or refund outstanding indebtedness previously incurred to finance activities referred to in subparagraph (a) above, on a secured or unsecured basis;
- (b) engaging the services of one or more underwriters, placement agents, consultants, attorneys, financial advisors and other persons whose services may be appropriate or desirable in connection with the acquisition and financing referred to above;
- (c) entering into contracts with any other economic development organizations sponsored by the County to help achieve the purposes described in paragraph (b) above; and

(d) in general, performing any and all acts and things, and exercise and any and all powers which may now or hereafter be lawful for the Corporation to do or exercise under and pursuant to the laws of the State of New York for the purpose of accomplishing any of the foregoing purposes of the Corporation.

FOURTH: The activities referred to in subparagraph (a) of paragraph THIRD above will achieve the lawful public objective of lessening the burdens of government, the carrying out of such purposes and the exercise of the powers conferred on the Corporation being the performance of an essential governmental function, it being understood that the performance of such activities will assist the County in reducing unemployment and promoting additional job growth and economic development.

FIFTH: The operations of the Corporation will be conducted within the territory of the County. Notwithstanding any other provision of this Certificate of Incorporation, the by-laws and any provision of law, so long as any Obligations remain outstanding, the Corporation will not do any of the following:

- (a) engage in any business or activity other than as set forth in paragraph THIRD;
- (b) without the consent of the County and the affirmative vote of two thirds of the members of the Board of Directors of the Corporation, (i) dissolve or liquidate, in whole or in part, or institute proceedings to be adjudicated bankrupt or insolvent, (ii) consent to the institution of bankruptcy or insolvency proceedings against it, (iii) file a petition seeking or consent to reorganization or relief under any applicable federal or state law relating to bankruptcy or insolvency, (iv) consent to the appointment of a receiver, liquidator, assignee, trustee, sequestrator or other similar official of the Corporation or a substantial part of its property, (v) make a general assignment for the benefit or creditors, (vi) admit in writing its inability to pay its debts generally as they become due or (vii) take any corporate action in furtherance of the actions set forth in clauses (i) through (vi) of this paragraph; or
- (c) without the consent of the County and the affirmative vote of two thirds of the members of the Board of Directors of the Corporation, merge or consolidate with any other corporation, company or entity or, except to the extent contemplated by paragraph THIRD hereof, sell all or substantially all of its assets or acquire all or substantially all of the assets or capital stock or other ownership interest of any other corporation, company or entity.

SIXTH: Pursuant to the requirements of Section 1411(e) of the N-PCL:

- (a) All income and earnings of the Corporation will be used exclusively for its corporate purposes or accrue and, subject to the Corporation's responsibilities under the Obligations, be paid to the New York Job Development Authority.
- (b) No part of the income or earnings of the Corporation will inure to the benefit or profit of, nor will any distribution of its property or assets be made to, any member, director or officer of the Corporation, or private person, corporate or individual, or to any other private interest, except that the Corporation may repay loans made to it and may repay contributions (other than dues) made to it to the extent that any such contribution may not be allowable as a deduction in computing taxable income under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended.

- (c) If the Corporation accepts a mortgage loan or loans from the New York Job Development Authority, the Corporation will dissolve in accordance with the provisions of paragraph (g) of Section 1411 of the N-PCL upon the repayment or other discharge in full by the Corporation or all such loans.
- SEVENTH: (a) The Corporation will not attempt to influence legislation by propaganda or otherwise, or participate in or intervene, directly or indirectly, any political campaign on behalf of or in opposition to any candidate for public office.
- (b) The Corporation will not engage in any activities not permitted to be carried on by an organization exempt from federal income taxation pursuant to Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, and the regulations promulgated thereunder.
- (c) The Corporation will not accept a mortgage loan or loans from the New York Job Development Authority.

EIGHTH: In the event of the dissolution of the Corporation or the winding up of its affairs, the Board of Directors will, after paying or making provision for the payment of all of the liabilities of the Corporation, distribute all of the remaining assets and property of the Corporation to the County, so that the County can use such assets and property to accomplish the purposes set forth in Section 1411(a) of the N-PCL. Any of such assets not so disposed of will be disposed of by order of the Supreme Court of the State of New York pursuant to Section 1008 of the N-PCL.

NINTH: The office of the Corporation will be located in Oneida County, New York. The Corporation at all times will:

- (a) upon request by the County, the Corporation will make available any and all books and records of the Corporation for inspection by the Chairman of the Oneida County Legislature and his or her staff; and
- (b) submit to the Oneida County Legislature an annual financial report together with a report of the operations and accomplishments of the Corporation for such annual period.
- (c) The governing body of the County, the New York State Authority Budget Office and the New York State Comptroller will have the right to conduct an annual audit of the books and records of the Corporation.

TENTH: The County is the sole member of the Corporation.

ELEVENTH: The Corporation will be managed by a Board of Directors, who are to be comprised of those persons named in paragraph TWELFTH hereof (the "Directors"). Each of the Directors will serve at the pleasure of the governing body of the County and continue to hold office until his or her successor is appointed by the governing body of the County.

The Corporation is deemed to be a public body (as such term is defined in the Open Meetings Law) and, as such, each meeting of the Board of Directors of the Corporation will be

conducted in the manner prescribed by the Open Meetings Law. The Directors will not receive compensation for services provided to or on behalf of the Corporation.

TWELFTH: The Corporation will consist of not less than three nor more than seven Directors. The Directors will be appointed by the governing body of the County and will include (a) the Chairman of Oneida County Industrial Development Agency, (b) the Vice-Chairman of Oneida County Industrial Development Agency, (c) the Treasurer of Oneida County Industrial Development Agency, (d) the Secretary of Oneida County Industrial Development Agency, and (e) any additional members of the Oneida County Industrial Development Agency.

- (a) The names and addresses of the initial Directors of the Corporation are as follows:
- (i) David Grow, Chairman, Oneida County Local Development Corporation, 153 Brooks Road, Rome, New York.
- (ii) Shawna Papale, Secretary, Oneida County Local Development Corporation, 153 Brooks Road, Rome, New York.
- (iii) Natalie Brown, Vice Chairman, Oneida County Local Development Corporation, 153 Brooks Road, Rome, New York.
- (iv) James Castilla, Assistant Secretary/Treasurer, Oneida County Local Development Corporation, 153 Brooks Road, Rome, New York.
- (v) Ferris Betrus, Member, Oneida County Local Development Corporation, 153 Brooks Road, Rome, New York.
- (vi) Michael Fitzgerald, Member, Oneida County Local Development Corporation, 153 Brooks Road, Rome, New York.
- (vii) Eugene Quadraro, Member, Oneida County Local Development Corporation, 153 Brooks Road, Rome, New York.
- (viii) Michael Valentine, Member, Oneida County Local Development Corporation, 153 Brooks Road, Rome, New York.
- (ix) Stephen Zogby, Member, Oneida County Local Development Corporation, 153 Brooks Road, Rome, New York.

It is acknowledged that the Directors hold comparable positions with Oneida County Industrial Development Agency established by Chapter 372 of the 1970 Laws of the State of New York, as amended. By reason of the shared public purposes of the Corporation and the Oneida County Industrial Development Agency, none of the Directors of the Corporation will be deemed to have a conflict of interest solely due to such person's position with the Oneida County Industrial Development Agency.

The powers of the corporation set forth in paragraph THIRD hereof will be subject to the following limitations:

- (A) The Corporation will only undertake projects that are not authorized by Article 18A of the New York State General Municipal Law (the "New York State Industrial Development Agency Act") unless the Corporation receives a written request from Oneida County Industrial Development Agency asking the Corporation to consider undertaking such project.
- (B) The bonds or notes and other obligations of the Corporation will not be a debt of the State of New York or the County of Oneida, and neither the State of New York nor the County of Oneida will be liable thereon, nor will they be payable out of any funds other than those of the Corporation.
- (C) The Corporation will hold a public hearing on any financial assistance in excess of \$100,000 proposed to be provided by the Corporation to a project at which interested parties will be provided with reasonable opportunity, both orally and in writing, to present their views with respect to the project. The Corporation will give the same notice of such hearing as the Oneida County Industrial Development Agency would be required to give pursuant to the provisions of Section 859-a and b of the General Municipal Law of the State of New York as if such hearing was a public hearing of the Oneida County Industrial Development Agency with respect to a project.
- (D) The Corporation shall issue Obligations only to refinance or refund outstanding indebtedness previously incurred to finance eligible projects and to pay related financing costs. The Corporation shall not issue Obligations to provide initial financing or "new money" for any project.

THIRTEENTH: The Corporation will be subject to the Public Authorities Accountability Act of 2005 (the "Act"). As such, the Corporation will be required to, among other things: (1) undergo annual independent audits and submit the results of such audits to the County and the New York State Authority Budget Office, (2) prepare and submit its annual budget to the County and the New York State Authority Budget Office, (3) adopt the various ethical, reporting, property disposition and disclosure policies required by the Act, and (4) form governance and audit committees to ensure the Corporation is in compliance with the Act and any other applicable laws.

FOURTEENTH: The Secretary of State of the State of New York is designated as agent of the Corporation upon whom process against it may be served. The post office address to which the Secretary of State will mail a copy of any process against the Corporation served upon him or her is Oneida County Local Development Corporation, 153 Brooks Road, Rome, New York 13441, Attn: Executive Director.

FIFTEENTH: The By-laws of the Corporation may be adopted, amended or repealed by a majority of the Directors of the Corporation upon 10 days notice to all of the Directors, provided, however, that the Corporation will not amend, alter, change or repeal any provision of the adopted By-laws without the consent of the Oneida County Executive.

SIXTEENTH: The Corporation reserves the right to amend, alter, change or repeal any provision contained in this Certificate of Incorporation, in any manner now or hereafter provided herein or by statute; provided, however, that (1) the Corporation will not amend, alter, change or repeal any provision of this Certificate of Incorporation without the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of the Board of Directors of the Corporation and the consent of the Chairman of the Oneida County Legislature, and (2) the Corporation will not amend or change any provision of this Certificate of Incorporation without first providing the Chairman of the Oneida County Legislature and the Directors with 10 days advance notice of any proposed amendment, alteration, change or repeal.

RESOLUTION APPROVING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF THE ONEIDA COUNTY LOCAL DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of County Legislators of the County of Oneida, New York as follows:

<u>Section 1</u>. It is hereby determined that the establishment of the Oneida County Local Development Corporation (the "Corporation") pursuant to Section 1411 of the Not-for-Profit Corporation Law of the State of New York as an instrumentality of the County of Oneida, New York (the "County") for the specific purpose of:

- (a) promoting community and economic development and the creation of jobs in the non-profit and for-profit sectors for the citizens of the County by developing and providing programs for not-for-profit institutions, manufacturing and industrial businesses and other entities to access low interest tax-exempt and non-tax-exempt financing for their eligible projects; and
- (b) undertaking projects and activities within the County for the purpose of relieving and reducing unemployment, bettering and maintaining job opportunities, carrying on scientific research for the purpose of aiding the County by attracting new industry to the County or by encouraging the development of, or retention of, an industry in the County, and lessening the burdens of government and acting in the public interest,

is in the best interest of the County and the purposes of the Corporation will lessen the burdens of County government, perform an essential governmental function of the County, and are in the public interest of the County.

<u>Section 2</u>. The establishment of the Corporation and the filing of the Certificate of Incorporation for the Corporation in the form attached hereto as <u>Exhibit A</u> (the "Certificate of Incorporation") is hereby approved. The initial members of the Board of Directors of the Corporation identified in the Certificate of Incorporation are hereby approved.

Section 3. The Corporation shall undergo an annual independent audit and submit the audit to the County Legislature, prepare and submit annual budgets to the County and form governance and audit committees to ensure the Corporation is in compliance with New York State laws.

Section 4. Bonds, notes and other obligations (the "Obligations") issued by the Corporation will not be backed by the full faith and credit of the County and will be non-recourse to the County. Obligations issued by the Corporation will be secured solely by the creditworthiness of a particular project. The Corporation shall issue Obligations only to refinance or refund outstanding indebtedness previously incurred to finance eligible projects and

to pay related financing costs. The Corporation shall not issue Obligations to provide initial financing or "new money" financing for any project.

Section 5. Except as expressly provided in the Corporation's Certificate of Incorporation, the County Executive is authorized and directed to act on behalf of the County in exercising the County's rights as a sole member of the Corporation under the New York Not-for-Profit Corporation Law, which delegation of authority includes, is not limited to, the power to execute all documents and agreements required to be executed by the County as a member of the Corporation and to approve the Corporation's bylaws.
