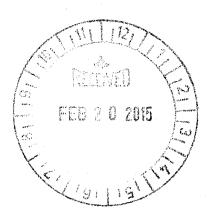

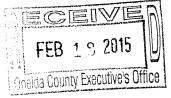

Dear County Executive Picente:

The Federal Transit Administration provides funds to cover up to 50 percent of the operating deficits for public transportation systems providing scheduled mass transit services in the non-urbanized and rural areas of the country. The federal funds are distributed on a bi-annual basis through the Section 5311 Urbanized Areas Formula program which is administered by the New York State Department of Transportation (NYSDOT).

Oneida County is the sponsor of the rural transportation services in the County provided by Birnie Bus Tours (BBT). The New York State Department of Transportation (NYSDOT) recently announced \$150,000 for 2015 and \$165,000 for 2016 allocated to Oneida County to support these rural transit services. These amounts will be matched with New York State Operating Assistance funds and Birnie Bus Tours own funds, to cover operating expenses. There are no Oneida County funds involved in the 2015-2016 Section 5311 application.

The NYSDOT's Section 5311 consolidated application includes both, operating assistance and capital investment grants. Based on bus replacement schedule and the 2014-18 Transportation Improvement Program, Oneida County will be purchasing four (4) 30 FT medium duty mid-size replacement buses with lifts for public transportation service in rural areas and one service truck. Projected total cost of this project is \$380,000. The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) share would be 80% of the total costs of capital equipment, NYS Department of Transportation share is 10% and the remaining 10 % will be paid by the local public transit operator (BBT).

New to the 2015-2016 Section 5311 application is a section to request Mobility Management project funding. For this funding cycle, Oneida County will be applying for operating funding, on behalf of the Parkway Center, for their rural Mobility Management project. The Federal share is 80% for the project, State share 10%, and the Local share 10% will be paid by Parkway Center.

It is a Federal requirement that every applicant who intends to apply and receive Federal assistance must submit annual certifications and assurances prior to grant approval. By signing the attached FTA 2015 Certifications and Assurances, Oneida County affirms its commitment to

comply with all relevant Federal statutes, regulations, executive orders, and administrative guidance for grant administration.

I request that you recommend to the Oneida County Board of Legislators for its consideration and approval the attached Resolution and Notarization Form authorizing you, as the Oneida County Executive, to file the Fiscal Year 2015-16 Section 5311 Consolidated Non-Urbanized Formula Grant application. I also request that you sign the signature pages of the Application, the Third Party Operating Agreement, and the FTA required Certification and Assurances for FFY 2015.

Oneida County received a NYSDEC Engineering Planning Grant award under last year's Consolidated Funding Application (CFA) program. A planning and engineering report will be prepared that will build off the findings of a prior high-level conceptual review of "Neutralization Plant" to treat for microchip manufacturing rinse waters. This prior report was commissioned by Mohawk Valley EDGE and completed in 2013.

In short, over 75% of wastewater discharged from microchip fabrication is general rinse water that only require pH neutralization to be suitable for either re-use or direct discharge to surface water bodies, such as the Barge Canal. If these rinse waters could be delivered to a special facility for pH adjustment, significant flows could be diverted from the Oneida County Water Pollution Control Plant.

This report would further investigate the feasibility of a neutralization plant with regard to public ownership, user fees, siting, costs, etc. The report will also include next-level design considerations such as whether the neutralization plant would be established to treat only rinse waters destined for surface water discharge or all rinse waters, including a portion that would be returned to the microchip manufacturer for reuse.

The cost of the report is \$62,500. Eighty percent (80%) of the cost of the report will be covered under the grant and the remaining 20% will be covered by EDGE. Oneida County will contract directly with EDGE to complete the report. A draft resolution is attached which allows me to execute the grant, approves contracting with EDGE to do the actual study and details that EDGE is responsible for the local match portion of the grant.

I would appreciate consideration of this matter by you and the Board of Legislators at your earliest possible convenience. I am available to meet with you or the Board to discuss this request and explain this in more detail. Thank you for your consideration in this matter.

WHEREAS, the County of Oneida was awarded an Engineering Planning Grant (EPG# 42484) through the 2014 Consolidated Funding Application (CFA) process by the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation and Environmental Facilities Corporation; and

WHEREAS, the Marcy NanaoCenter is a 450-acre greenfield site being developed for the semiconductor industry and is the largest shovel-ready semiconductor site in the world.

WHEREAS, the semiconductor fabrication is highly water intensive process and will require large amounts of fresh water for production resulting in a similar magnitudes of wastewater discharges; and

WHEREAS, the largest wastewater stream generated by a semiconductor fabricator is General Rinse Water (GRW); and

WHEREAS, GRW requires only pH neutralization, a simple treatment process, prior to reusing the GRW for semiconductor fabrication or to be permitted for direct discharge to surface waters; and

WHEREAS, the reuse of treated-GRW reduces the volume of fresh water that the semiconductor fabricator requires and the reuse and/or surface water discharge of treated-GRW reduces the longer-term capacity demands on the local sanitary sewer system and the Oneida County Water Pollution Control Plant; and

WHEREAS, the Engineering Planning Grant will provide eighty percent (80%) of the funding necessary to study the feasibility of constructing a Wastewater Treatment System (WWTS) facility near or at the Marcy NanoCenter site to treat GRW; and

WHEREAS, the twenty percent (20%) local match requirement relative to the cost of the study will be reimbursed to Oneida County from the Mohawk Valley Economic Development Growth Enterprise Corporation (EDGE); and

WHEREAS, the study may be used to leverage addition funding, in future CFA rounds, to design or construct a GRW WWTS facility; and

WHEREAS, 6 NYCRR Section 617.5 (Title 6 of the New York Code of Rules and Regulations) under the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQR) provides that certain actions identified in subdivision (c) of that section are not subject to environmental review under the Environmental Conservation Law;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT Steven P. Devan, P.E., Commissioner Oneida County Department of Water Quality & Water Pollution Control (WQ&WPC), is authorized to execute a Grant Agreement with the NYS Environmental Facilities Corporation and any and all other contracts, documents and instruments necessary to bring about the Project and to fulfill the County's obligations under the Engineering Planning Grant Agreement.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that County of Oneida authorizes and appropriates a minimum of 20% local match as required by the Engineering Planning Grant Program for the General Rinse Water Treatment Facility Feasibility Study (EPG #42484). Under the Engineering Planning Grant Program, this local match must be at least 20% of the total project cost. The maximum local share appropriated subject to any changes agreed to by the Commissioner of WQ&WPC shall not exceed \$12,500 based upon a total

estimated maximum project cost of \$62,500. The Commissioner of WQ&WPC may increase this local match through the use of in kind services without further approval from the Oneida County.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT that the County of Oneida hereby determines that the proposed General Rinse Water Treatment Facility Feasibility Study is a Type II action in accordance with 6 NYCRR Section 617.5(c)(18) which states that "information collection including.. engineering studies...that do not commit the agency to undertake, fund or approve any Type I or Unlisted action" is not subject to review under 6 NYCRR Part 617.

Oneida County is expected to welcome the semiconductor fabrication (e.g., memory chips or microprocessors) industry to Marcy, New York as part of the "Nano Utica" intiative within a few short years. The semiconductor fabrication (FAB) process is highly water intensive and will require large amounts of fresh water (up to 6 MGD per FAB) which will incur similar magnitudes of wastewater discharge. The general rinse water (GRW) is the largest volume of wastewater generated (~75% to 80% of process wastewater volume) and is generated from rinsing processes using ultrapure water (UPW). The GRW if properly segregated from the other wastewater streams, requires only pH neutralization prior to reuse by the FAB or surface water discharge. Under this grant, the County will further investigate the feasibility of building a County-owned Wastewater Treatment System (WWTS) to treat GRW.

New York State has invested 100's of millions of dollars into the Computer Chip Commercialization Center (Quad-C) at SUNYIT and the Marcy "Nanocenter" site, which is the future home of a FAB. Quad-C and Nanocenter along with State's success in Fishkill (IBM), Malta (Global Foundries), and its investment in nano-technology education and research at the SUNY College of Nanoscale Science and Engineering (CNSE) in Albany is beginning to transform the New York economy in ways not seen since the Erie Canal. Alain Kaloyeros, president/CEO of CNSE predicts that the new "Nano Canal" will eventually expand westward accross Upstate. As communities, such as greater Utica, prepare for a FAB, they are intensely evaluating the capacity of their water, sewer, and energy infrastructure and searching for ways, in partnership with the FAB, to build in sustainable features.

The Wastewater Infrastructure Engineering Planning Grant will assist municipalities with a Median Household Income (MHI) of \$65,000 or less with the engineering and planning costs of CWSRF-eligible water quality projects. - required by a SPDES permit;
- upgrade or replace an existing wastewater system;

- construct a wastewater treatment and/or collection system for an unsewered area.
- identified in a Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL)

Smart Growth alternative(s) and green infrastructure alternative(s) must be considered and documented in the engineering report.

In accordance with the laws, rules and regulations governing the CWSRF, projects eligible under Section 212 (Publically Owned Treatment Works) of the federal Clean Water Act must be publicly-owned.

The following minimum alternatives need to be considered for projects with *no existing wastewater infrastructure*:

- decentralized systems;
- o new sewers and connection to regional wastewater treatment facility; and
- o new sewers and a wastewater treatment facility.

The following minimum alternatives need to be considered for projects with *existing wastewater infrastructure*:

- o rebuilding existing wastewater infrastructure; and
- o connecting to regional wastewater treatment facility.

To obtain the funds for the design and construction of their project, applicants must complete reviews under both the State Environmental Quality Review (SEQR) Act and State Environmental Review Process (SERP). Applicants also must have their projects reviewed by the New York State Office of Parks and Historic Preservation's State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO).

Ineligible Activities

- Projects that do not lead to the restoration or protection of a surface waterbody.
- Projects and scope listed on the 2014 CWSRF Intended Use Plan Annual Project Priority List.
- Design and construction costs for the wastewater treatment and/or collection systems.

Selection Criteria

Projects will be scored and selected based on the following criteria.

<u>Additional consideration</u> will be given to projects supporting the NY Rising Community Reconstruction Program, NY Rising Countywide Resiliency Plan and/or advance a Regional Economic Development Council Opportunity Agenda strategy.

Award Criteria Details

Eligible Area, City, County Population Limits or Population Target Types:

- Applicants from every region of the state are encouraged to apply.
- Municipalities as defined in 21 NYCRR 2602 New York State Clean Water Revolving Fund Regulations; and
- Median household income (MHI) of the municipality is equal to or less than \$65,000 according
 to the United States Census 2010, American Community Survey,
 http://factfinder2.census.gov/faces/nav/jsf/pages/index.xhtml.

Limitations:

- Grant awards will be limited to:
 - \$50,000 per project for municipalities with a population of 50,000 or greater according to the United States Census 2010, American Community Survey, http://factfinder2.census.gov/faces/nav/jsf/pages/index.xhtml.
 - \$30,000 per project for municipalities with a population of less than 50,000 according to the United States Census 2010, American Community Survey, http://factfinder2.census.gov/faces/nav/jsf/pages/index.xhtml.
- All grants require a local match equal to 20% of the total project cost.

Example: Grant Award: \$50,000

Local match: \$12,500

Total Cost Engineering Planning Grant: \$62,500

• The Departments may be able to fund only one project per municipality in this Round. If an applicant is submitting multiple applications for their municipality, they are asked to prioritize their projects.

Long Range Goals:

Successful applicants will use the engineering report completed under this grant when seeking financing through the CWSRF program or other financial means to further pursue the recommended solution.

Project Term Completion Dates:

Grant recipients must submit a complete engineering report within 9 months of their grant agreement being executed.

Matching Fund Requirements/Deadlines:

- The grant will provide for up to 80% of the total eligible project costs set forth in the application. The applicant is required to provide the balance of the funds needed to complete the initial planning undertaken with the grant.
- A minimum 20% local match is required. Match can include cash and/or in-kind services. Other grants may not be used for local match. The applicant should identify the source of the match at the time that the application is submitted.

<u>Grant Payment</u>: The grant will be disbursed in two payments. The municipality will be eligible to receive \$15,000, as an advance payment once the grant agreement is executed. The remainder of the grant award will be paid when the municipality's engineering report and planning has been completed and approved by DEC and EFC.

Successful Applicant Requirements

<u>Documentation</u>: Recipients must provide documentation of the following requirements before entering into a grant agreement for the planning project.

- Legal right to own, operate and maintain the project for the duration of its useful life.
- Compliance with the New York State Smart Growth Infrastructure Policy Act of 2010.
- Compliance with the New York State's Minority/Woman-owned Business Enterprises (M/WBE) requirements. (http://www.nysefc.org/Default.aspx?tabid=485)
- Detailed final budget and plan of finance including all third party funding agreements, and satisfaction of the minimum 20% local match requirement. (http://www.nysefc.org/Default.aspx?tabid=485)
- Local resolution authorizing and obligating local match funds. Match can include cash and/or in-kind services. Other grants may not be used for local match. Sample resolution language: http://www.nysefc.org/Default.aspx?tabid=485
- Designation of an Authorized Representative for the project.
- Executed Engineering Agreement, including Minority/Women Owned Business Enterprises
 (M/WBE) language. An MWBE Work Plan and Utilization Plan will be required if the Engineering
 Agreement exceeds \$25,000.
- Completion of Environmental Quality Review (SEQR) Act. Please refer to EFC's "Environmental Review Guidance" on EFC's website for more information on the SEQR processes.
- Acknowledgement of project review by the New York State Office of Parks and Historic Preservation's State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO).

Key Definitions

<u>Engineering Report</u> - means the document or documents, which determines the technical and economic feasibility of a CWSRF eligible project. [Reference: 21 NYCRR 2602.2(a)(22) New York State Clean Water Revolving Fund Regulations]

Engineering reports should be prepared in accordance with requirements identified in *Recommended Standards for Wastewater Facilities* (2004 edition), commonly known as the 10-State Standards (http://10statesstandards.com/waterstandards.html) or TR-16 Guides for the Design of Wastewater Treatment Works prepared by New England Interstate Water Pollution Control Commission (http://www.neiwpcc.org/tr16guides.asp). All engineering reports should include the following sections.

<u>Municipality</u> - means any county, city, town, village, district corporation, county or town improvement district, Indian reservation wholly within New York State, any public benefit corporation or public authority established pursuant to the laws of New York or any agency of New York State which is empowered to construct and operate a project, or any two or more of the foregoing which are acting jointly in connection with a project. [Reference: 21 NYCRR 2602.2(a)(49) New York State Clean Water Revolving Fund Regulations]

<u>Planning</u> - means the orderly development of a project concept from the original statement of need or purpose through the evaluation of alternatives to a final recommendation on a course of action and measures to implement the selected alternative, including completion of the environmental review process. [Reference: 21 NYCRR 2602.2(a)(51) New York State Clean Water Revolving Fund Regulations]
