Honorable Members:

I am forwarding the proposed 2016-2017 Operating Budget for the Mohawk Valley Community College (MVCC), which was approved by the Board of Trustees at their May 16, 2016 meeting. This proposed budget has gross expenditures of \$51,437,073, a 0.9% decrease over the 2015-2016 budget year.

This budget calls for a local sponsor share of \$7,723,458, which is exactly the same the amount of the sponsor share in the 2015-2016 budget year.

We have performed a lengthy review of this budget with the full cooperation of President VanWagoner, his staff and the Board of Trustees.

As is more fully set forth in the attached correspondence from President Van Wagoner, the proposed budget reflects a modest decrease (-0.9%) in expenditures.

The MVCC budget proposes raising the tuition for full time students by \$124, raising the tuition from \$3,960 to \$4,084 for a 3.1% increase. This increase will still keep MVCC tuition the fifth lowest tuition of any postsecondary institution in New York State. MVCC has also proposed to raise the tuition of part time students for the fourth year in a row. The proposal will increase the per credit hour fee from \$160 to \$165. The proposed budget expects New York State aid to decrease by \$169,812 or -1.18% as a direct result in the decrease in enrollment. NYS has increased state aid from \$2,597 per full time student to \$2,697 per full time student or approximately 4% per full time student. The proposed budget also anticipates a 4% decrease in enrollment for the 2016-17 academic year.

The proposed budget calls for using approximately \$1,500,000 of its current fund balance which is approximately \$1,000,000 above the previous year's budget. The fund balance is estimated to be \$6.1 million at August 31, 2016 which represents a little more than the 5% minimum recommended by the state.

MVCC is also asking to continue the one time specific request of \$100,000 to be used to update five computer labs at the Utica Campus. This will enable MVCC to maintain its scheduled equipment replacement schedule. MVCC has also requested an additional \$125,000 to continue funding for Achieving the Dream initiative.

Tentative Agreement between the United Public Service Employees Union Blue Collar Unit and the County of Oneida:

Dear County Executive Picente:

The County negotiating team has entered into a Tentative Agreement with the United Public Service Employees Union in regard to approximately 210 employees serving in positions in various Oneida County Departments and Mohawk Valley Community College.

The union membership ratified the agreement on June 8, 2016.

In summary, the Tentative Agreement holds as follows:

Length of Contract

Two Years

(January 1, 2016-December 31, 2017)

Wages:

A)

For employees on the salary schedule:

2016 1.5% increase to the salary schedule effective January 1, 2016
Advance 1 step effective January 1, 2016
Drop the first step of the salary schedule

2017 1.5% increase to salary schedule effective January 1, 2017 Advance 1 step effective January 1, 2017

B) For Employees off the salary schedule

2016 2.75 % increase to base salary effective January 1, 2016

2017 2.50 % increase to base salary effective January 1, 2017

Effective July 1, 2017 Section 9.9 of the Collective Bargaining Agreement is deleted. The Section provided an additional \$.80 per hour for various titles and divisions in the bargaining unit.

Approximately half the unit was eligible for the differential. To replace the \$.80 per hour \$1664 will be added to the salary schedule effective July 1, 2017.

I have attached a copy of the Memorandum of Agreement that details the other terms of the agreement.

The Tentative Agreement is in line with settlements in the Public Sector statewide. Therefore, I would ask that you forward the matter to the Oneida County Board of Legislators for legislative approval at the July 13, 2016 meeting.

# MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT by and between ONEIDA COUNTY/MVCC and UPSEU (BLUE COLLAR UNIT)

WHEREAS, the Collective Bargaining Agreement between Oneida County/MVCC (hereinafter referred to as the "County") and the United Public Service Employees Union Blue Collar Unit (hereinafter referred to as the "Union") expired on December 31, 2015; and

WHEREAS, the parties have met on a number of occasions in an effort to negotiate a successive agreement; and

WHEREAS, the parties have reached a settlement and further wish to commit such to writing;

NOW, THEREFORE, the parties hereto agree that the current Agreement and all terms and conditions of employment set forth therein shall remain in full force and effect except as herein modified:

#### ARTICLE 9 ADMINISTRATION OF THE SALARY SCHEDULE

#### 9.1 Salary

- A. On January 1, 2016, the 2015 schedule shall be increased by 1.5% to create the 2016 schedule. On January 1, 2017, the 2016 schedule shall be increased by 1.5% to create the 2017 schedule.
- C. Each employee who has been "off the schedule" shall be eligible to receive a 2.75% increase to his/her salary effective January 1, 2016, and a 2.5% increase to his/her salary effective January 1, 2017.
- D. On January 1, 2016, Step 1 will be dropped from the 2016 salary schedule. (The remaining steps shall not be renumbered.
- E. Effective July 1, 2017, the 2017 schedule shall be increased by \$1,664.00 for each Grade and Step. Effective July 1, 2017, each employee off the salary schedule shall have his/her base salary increased by \$1,664.00. Effective July 1, 2017, compensation under Section 9.9 will cease, and said section will be eliminated and removed from any subsequent agreement(s).

#### 9.7 Starting Salary

New employees shall normally be paid at the Step 1 rate of the Grade, however, when a department head demonstrates severe and continued recruitment difficulty for a specific job title,



the County reserves the right to hire up to the third (3<sup>rd</sup>) Step on the salary schedule. Such action shall occur only when authorized by the County Commissioner of Personnel. Any employee in that job title whose salary falls below the new starting salary shall have his/her salary raised to the same level as that of the new starting salary.

9.8 Retroactivity

#### ARTICLE 21 HEALTH INSURANCE COVERAGE

- E. The LBS traditional plan will not be available to employees hired after January 1, 2016. The County reserves the right to reopen the LBS traditional plan with notification to the UPSEU.
- F. Employees may enter one of the health insurance plans during the open enrollment period as determined by the Health Insurance Office.

#### **NEW/ADDITIONAL CLAUSES:**

- 1. **Drug testing policy.** Also all bargaining unit members involved in motor vehicle accidents while driving County/MVCC vehicles or personal vehicles for County/MVCC business causing property damage to County/MVCC property or Private property, or if a summons or traffic ticket is issued will be subject to testing in accordance with the post-accident procedures set forth in the Oneida County CDL Policy. Also all bargaining unit members involved in accidents while using, driving or operating County/MVCC equipment causing property damage to County/MVCC property or Private property will be subject to testing in accordance with the post-accident procedures set forth in the Oneida County CDL Policy. Nothing in this Section limits the County's rights under the Oneida County CDL Policy.
- 2. Water Pollution Control 12 hour shift. Codify MOU regarding 12 hour shifts at Water Pollution Control.
- 3. Water Treatment Plant Operators Reimbursement of licensure expense for Water Treatment Plant Operators. Prior to enrolling in the training listed below, the employee and the County shall sign an agreement relative to the reimbursements listed below which shall specify the exact cost of the training. The County shall pay for the relevant training. Once the

County has paid for said training, in the event the employee resigns, the employee shall reimburse the County for the cost of the same as follows:

a.	Resignation within one (1) year of obtaining a Grade 3A	100% reimbursement
b.	Resignation within two (2) years of obtaining a Grade 3A	75 % reimbursement
c.	Resignation within three (3) years of obtaining a Grade 3A	50% reimbursement
d.	Resignation within one (1) year of obtaining a Grade 4A	100% reimbursement
e.	Resignation within two (2) years of obtaining a Grade 4A	75 % reimbursement
e.	Resignation within three (3) years of obtaining a Grade 4A	50% reimbursement

4. MVCC Senior Public Safety Officer expense for Phase I Peace Officer Training. Prior to enrolling in the training listed below, the employee and MVCC shall sign an agreement relative to the reimbursements listed below which shall specify the exact cost of the training. MVCC shall pay for the relevant training. Once MVCC has paid for said training, in the event the employee resigns, the employee shall reimburse MVCC for the cost of the same, including but not limited to tuition, fees, housing, mileage, etc., as follows:

a.	Resignation within one (1) year of obtaining a Grade 3A	100% reimbursement
b.	Resignation within two (2) years of obtaining a Grade 3A	75 % reimbursement
c.	Resignation within three (3) years of obtaining a Grade 3A	50% reimbursement

In accordance with the provisions of Section 21 of New York State Municipal Home Rule Law, I am returning herewith Local Law B of 2016 regulating the sale of certain fireworks in Oneida County.

I take this action for a variety of reasons. First and foremost, this legislation has been rejected by all major firefighting associations across the state including the Oneida County Fire Advisory Board on which several county legislators sit. Law enforcement has also joined in opposition including the Sheriff of Oneida County. Medical personnel, from Hospital trauma physicians and pediatricians to emergency room doctors, have all weighed in on the dangers of these fireworks. When those on the front lines of protecting our persons and property are adamant in opposition of devices they see as dangerous, for all ages and in all circumstances then I must ask, why are you enacting a law that flies in the very face of their professional expertise.

The above is reason enough to veto such a proposal. I also believe issues such as these often blind us into believing personal responsibility will carry the day. While it is our hope that this is the case; there are many other factors to consider. Children, who are by definition without the personal responsibility many have used as a justification to pass this law, left unattended even for the smallest time period can cause serious damage with fireworks stored somewhere in the home. While we discourage children from all type of fire play we would be in fact encouraging it by the use of these devices.

For first responders the danger goes even further. First responders on the scene of a fire would have no knowledge of the quantity or location of such devices in a home or any establishment since the law has established no guidelines for storage. While the law states that these devices can only be sold at certain times it makes no distinction of where people must store or when they can use these fireworks throughout the rest of the year. Such a lack of regulation in any area, especially in cities with aging buildings and houses that sit within feet of each other can cause serious problems at a fire scene. While those in favor cite the number of counties that have passed such legislation it is important to note those which have not. Those counties with major cities all across upstate New York have said no to this legislation.

Other proponents point to potential tax revenue generated or lost by such legislation. Proponents cite other neighboring counties who have opted into this legislation. I will not support any legislation that puts anyone in harms way for the benefit of added revenue. Such an argument flies in the very face of what those that elect us would desire us to do.

It has been stated that no serious incidents have occurred in counties that have enacted the law. First, we do not weigh the passage of any vital legislation based on the number of incidents, nor should we. In reality, due to the limited timeframe, the Office of Fire Prevention has been unable to compile specific data on whether incidents have occurred. What we do know is keeping these items illegal is what our fire and law enforcement professionals consider vital to public safety.

From the very passage of this state legislation I have opposed it based on all of the reasons stated above. I am also opposed when any legislation that has serious implications on public safety is passed by the state and then left to individual counties to decide. Such legislation by checker boarding is confusing to our constituents, pits business against business and makes it very difficult to enforce the laws that protect our people.

In conclusion, I do not believe we should enact a law that clearly has a negative impact on the safety of our community and the very people we trust in protecting it. I therefore cannot endorse it.

Attached is an agreement that requires both Board of Legislators action and your signature to finalize the contract execution between Oneida County and the following municipalities for their local contribution to the County for the annual local match to the State Transportation Operating Assistance (STOA) that Oneida County pays to Central New York Regional Transportation Authority (CNYRTA). I respectfully request that the contract for the Town of Whitestown be approved as the master template for all STOA local contribution contracts, which are all of the same content, with the exception of agency name, payment schedule and funding amount.

The municipalities and their annual payment amounts are as follows:

City of Rome	\$220,000
City of Utica	\$228,000
Town of Kirkland	\$ 12,000
Town of New Hartford	\$ 30,000
Town of Whitestown	\$ 25,000

In April 2005, Oneida County joined the CNYRTA, which ultimately assumed all operations of the Utica Transit Authority (UTA) and the Rome VIP Transportation.

As required by state law, an annual local match to the State Transportation Operating Assistance in the amount of \$515,000 is paid to CNYRTA by the County. In 2005 the County entered into five year agreements with the cities of Rome and Utica, and the towns of New Hartford, Whitestown and Kirkland to reimburse the County for the local match based on the historic local share each had previously paid for many years. These agreements were negotiated under the premise of holding the municipalities harmless from any additional cost while maintaining the existing transit service. The original five year agreements were subsequently renewed for the additional five year period 2010-2014.

On December 31, 2014, the current five year agreements between the municipalities and the County for the local share reimbursements to the County expired.

This agreement proposes that the municipalities continue to pay their current local contribution to the County with no change to the agreed upon amounts for another five years. These are the amounts each municipality would be paying now had they continued under the previous transit operations. The hold harmless approach agreed to ten years ago is still valid and its continuation for another five years will result in continued public transit service for all at no additional cost for a total of fifteen years.

The attached agreements are for the period January 1, 2015 through December 31, 2019. Please submit the attached draft Resolution to the Board of Legislators for their consideration and action.



In a continuing effort to assist businesses throughout Oneida County, we are proposing to apply for Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding made available by the New York State Office of Community Renewal (OCR) through their 2016 Economic Development Program. The New York State Office of Community Renewal (OCR) has created a more flexible, year-round process for funding eligible economic development projects under the CDBG Program. The open funding round allows municipalities with projects that are ready to move forward to apply for funding at any time throughout the year.

The Master Agreement calls for the submission of work orders with associated pricing for specific tasks that are needed as the project develops.

Dear County Executive Picente:

Preliminary and final designs have been prepared for the expansion of the solids handling and disposal systems at the Oneida County Water Pollution Control Plant (WPCP). This expansion will allow the WPCP to accept additional flows and loads resulting from sanitary sewer overflow (SSO) mitigation in the Sauquoit Creek Pumping Station (SCPS) basin, as well as ongoing combined sewer overflow (CSO) mitigation in the City of Utica. Preliminary and final designs were performed under work orders #24 and #24, Amendment 1. Under this proposed work order, #24-Amendment 2, construction program management/administration, resident representation, startup, commissioning and engineering services during construction will be provided for the construction phase of the solids handling upgrades.

Construction under work order #24 constitutes the first major construction project of the estimated \$265M to be spent for the SCPS upgrades, new force main and WPCP upgrades. In consideration of this first project, the services included under this work order amendment include those specific to this work order, and also those services needed to establish the organizational and management systems to support the program of plant upgrades and expansion of this size over the full six-year construction period (2016-2021). The upcoming construction program has significant challenges which need to be effectively addressed, including the time frame during which the construction projects need to be bid and constructed, the complexity, amount of work and the associated dollar value, the spatial limitations at the WPCP, the need to keep the plant operating and meeting permit limits during construction, and the administrative requirements of such a large program. There are potentially as many as 20 separate construction contracts that will be let during the course of the construction program.

The Department feels that the County will be best served by a level of support beyond which past smaller projects have required and that can be effectively managed with conventional construction support resources. As the overall program managers, the project team of consultants, under the GHD Consulting Services, Inc. Master Agreement, has prepared a comprehensive Program Construction Management (PCM) approach for the entire six-year construction period, to assist the County with constructing and commissioning the upgrades. This approach will provide the following features/advantages:

- Overall program Construction Manager, providing a single source of responsibility and point of contact
- A consistent approach across all projects/contracts in managing correspondence, submittals, request for information, modifications, claims and other project elements
- Schedule management of both the overall program master schedule as well as those related to each individual project
- Program-wide document control system to streamline project controls and communication
- Program-wide cost tracking and control

- Built-in coordination between the engineering design team, the Resident Project Representatives and PCM
- Establishment of risk management processes
- Monitoring site logistics and coordination between individual projects and ongoing WPCP operations
- Institutional knowledge through the continuity of the design team's involvement

GHD has proposed Work Order #24. Amendment 2 in the amount of \$4,635,000 as the budget to accomplish the tasks included herein. Department staff have reviewed the work order amendment and found it to be acceptable. Funding for this work is provided by capital project HG-482.
