

Through our efforts, we were able to identify for closure 11 capital projects. Please see attached list. These 11 projects have a combined total of \$940,026.10 in unused, unspent funds. Of this total \$414,926.76 applies to General Fund Debt, while the remaining \$525,099.34 is applicable to Sewer Fund Debt. Upon approval of the board to commence closure, all \$940,026.10 will be transferred to our Debt Service Funds for payment of bonds. This transaction reduces the burden on our General and Sewer Funds by decreasing the amount of money needed to be transferred to their respective Debt Service Funds. Thus, this helps us maintain a stable tax levy and sewer fee.

During my term in office, including this request, my office has closed out 237 capital projects, while using 5,910,118.27 of surplus funds to help pay down bonded debt.

Subsequent to your review and approval, would you please forward this to the full Board of Legislators for their adoption at their November 9, 2022 meeting

As always, thank you for your support and consideration.

Attached, please find an agreement that requires both Board of Legislators action and your signature between the Oneida County Stop-DWI Program and the City of Utica, through its Utica Police Department. This agreement provides funding for the City of Utica to conduct High Visibility Engagement Campaigns, formerly called Crackdown Patrols, during the holidays. This funding is 100% reimbursable to Oneida County from a grant received from the New York State Stop-DWI Foundation. No County dollars are needed for this contract.

I am respectfully requesting that this contract with the City of Utica be approved as a template agreement by the Board of Legislators for all listed police agency conduct High Visibility Engagement Campaigns contracts, which are all the same content, with the exception of agency name, locality, and dollar amount.

### 2011 UPSTATE QUALITY IMPROVEMENT & CASELOAD **REDUCTION GRANT, NYS OILS (Distribution #1)**

This grant allowed the Public Defender Office to hire 1 full-time attorney, 1 full-time paralegal and 1 full-time investigator. The purpose of the grant was to help reduce the caseload of the city court attorneys whose caseloads averaged 1000 cases per year. This is a 3-year grant and has been renewed in 2014 and 2017 (see below).

### 2013 COUNSEL AT FIRST APPEARANCE GRANT, NYS OILS

This grant allowed the Public Defender Office to hire 2 full-time attorneys and 1 part-time attorney. The purpose of the grant was to develop and maintain a program within the office to ensure an attorney at every firstappearance (i.e. arraignment) for an indigent defendant charged with criminal offenses throughout the county of Oneida's 43 town and village courts as well as city courts after-hour arraignments. Oneida County was one of the first "small" counties to provide this representation at arraignment in Upstate New York. This grant is a 3-year grant and was renewed in 2017 (see below).

### 2013 UPSTATE QUALITY IMPROVEMENT & CASELOAD **REDUCTION GRANT, NYS OILS (Distribution #2)**

This grant allowed the Public Defender Office to hire 1 full-time case worker to assist attorneys with clients in need of supplemental assistance such as drug/alcohol treatment, mental health treatment, parenting classes, domestic violence classes. Oneida County was one of the first "small" counties to have a case worker of this kind in Upstate New York.

### 2016 REGIONAL IMMIGRATION ASSISTANCE CENTER **GRANT, NYS OILS**

This was a competitive grant awarded to Oneida County through the Public Defender - Criminal Division Office to hire 2 full-time, experienced attorneys and 1 full-time paralegal dedicated 100% to the design. implementation and advancement of a regional immigration assistance center. The office provides training to mandated representation attorneys and judges in the Fifth and Sixth Judicial Districts covering 16 counties. The two co-directors provide legal assistance to attorneys in those 16 counties regarding possible immigration consequences of charges in criminal court and admissions in family court pursuant to Padilla v. Kentucky. Oneida County hosts one of six Centers awarded this grant in all of New York State.

### 2017 CENTRALIZED ARRAIGNMENT PART GRANT, NYS OILS

This grant allowed the Public Defender Office to hire 1 full-time attorney to cover all after-hour arrangements for all county, city, town and village courts in Oneida County. The purpose of this grant is to ensure that all defendants are represented at all times, for any court, at the critical time of arraignment. Oneida County was one of four counties to pilot the program in Upstate New York.

### 2019 UPSTATE QUALITY IMPROVEMENT & CASELOAD REDUCTION GRANT, NYS OILS (Distributions #3 & #4)

This grant, in continuing its commitment to providing quality defense services, is to address the lack of sufficient personnel in light of the caseload "cap" on cases established by the Indigent Legal Services Board and the Hurrell-Harring (HH) settlement court. The caseload cap provides the maximum number of cases allowed by an attorney representing defendants with specific types of cases. The PD-Crim office is currently in the process of coming into compliance with these caseload limits with the





A LOCAL LAW EXTENDING THE HOTEL OCCUPANCY TAX CURRENTLY IMPOSED BY LOCAL LAW NO. 6 OF 2019 PURSUANT TO CHAPTER 644 OF THE LAWS OF 1984, AS AMENDED.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF ONEIDA AS FOLLOWS:

### SECTION A. TITLE

This Local Law shall be known as the "Local Law Extending the Hotel Occupancy Tax Currently Imposed by Local Law No. 6 of 2019 Pursuant to Chapter 644 of the Laws of 1984, as Amended."

### SECTION B. LEGISLATIVE INTENT

The intent of this Local Law is to extend the Oneida County Hotel Occupancy Tax, the purpose of such tax being to promote Oneida County, its cities, towns and villages in order to increase convention, trade show and tourist business in the County.

### SECTION C. EXTENSION OF THE HOTEL OCCUPANCY TAX

Section 24 of Local Law No. 3 of 1993, as previously amended by Local Law No. 6 of 2019 is hereby amended to read as follows:

"This Local Law shall remain in full force and effect only through December 31, 2025."

### SECTION D. EFFECTIVE DATE

This Local Law shall take effect upon filing with the Secretary of State in accordance with Section 20, 21, 22 and 27 of the Municipal Home Rule Law.

During my tenure we have experienced the most turnover in my department with these critical positions as the salary does not accurately reflect the requirements of the job. One of these two positions will again become vacant in two weeks as an employee will be transferring to a much higher paying position in the Planning Department.

In an effort to recruit and retain experienced, dedicated employees in this crucial position, we are requesting an upgrade of the title of Senior Payroll Clerk from a 19W to a 22W. For 2023 this would be an increase of \$4,095.

Daytime services will incorporate supplementary services such as case management, housing assistance, vocational, spiritual or wellness programs, mental health and substance use screenings, assessments or referrals, or other positive recreational activities.

This Agreement is for the term October 1, 2022, through September 30, 2027 and has a maximum total cost of \$3,776,621.00 for the duration of this Agreement the contract has a start date of October 1, 2022 to cover start-up costs and expenses, with an understanding that, if available, outside funding sources such as HUD Funding Opportunities award would be prioritized for overlapping budget lines. The local cost to support this effort is 29.97% or \$1,131,853.31.

#### AND

### THE VILLAGE OF BOONVILLE

THIS GRANT AGREEMENT (hereinafter "Agreement") is made between the County of Oneida, a municipal corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of New York, with its principal place of business located at 800 Park Ave., Utica, New York (hereinafter the "County"), and the Village of Boonville, a municipal corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of New York, with its principal place of business located at 13149 State Route 12, Boonville, New York (hereinafter the "Grantee").

WHEREAS, on July 28, 2021, County Executive Anthony J. Picente Jr. announced the launch of the Oneida County Main Street Program, a grant program, to provide support to local municipal downtown development projects, assist in the safe and efficient redesign of main streets and promote investment and business growth; and

WHEREAS, the County has authorized five-million dollars in capital funds to be utilized for municipalities within Oneida County to plan and implement complete street and safety projects under the program designated as the Oneida County Main Street Program (hereinafter the "Grant Program"); and

WHEREAS, the Grantee was one of eleven municipalities that applied to and is participating in the Grant Program; and

WHEREAS, it is the County's intention that the available capital funds will be distributed equally among the participating municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the Grantee through the Grant Program planning process identified projects within the Village of Boonville for funding through the Grant Program; and

WHEREAS, the Grantee's application has been reviewed and 13 of the proposed projects have been approved (collectively, the "Projects," individually, the "Project"), and the County has determined that the Grantee should receive such Main Street assistance (said Projects are attached hereto as Exhibits 1 Project List and 2 Project Map, respectively); and

WHEREAS, the County has accepted the estimate of the cost to complete each Project; and

WHEREAS, the Grantee acknowledges the total amount of County funds available for the Grant Program is Five-million Dollars, that the Grant Program funds shall be allocated to multiple projects throughout eleven municipalities in the County and that the County contribution to any one Project shall not exceed fifty percent (50%) of the total cost to complete each Project; and

WHEREAS, the Grantee represents that it is duly qualified and willing to complete the Projects.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is agreed between the County and the Grantee as follows:

- 1. A. It is within the discretion of the Grantee to determine which Projects to proceed with. This Agreement does not obligate the Grantee to complete all or any of the Projects. However, in order to receive the Grant from the County for any Project, the Grantee must complete the Project.
  - B. Completion of the Projects shall include the following:
    - i. The Grantee shall provide notice of intent to complete a Project to the County's authorized representative, prior to commencing work.
    - ii. The Grantee shall complete the Projects as specified in the Grantee's application for the Grant. Once this Agreement is signed, the Grantee will not be allowed to make changes to the Projects without the prior written approval of the County.
    - iii. The Grantee shall be responsible for the administration, supervision, management, and Project oversight that may be required for the work performed under this Grant.
    - iv. The Grantee shall comply with all federal, state, and local laws and regulations and will obtain any site-specific permits required.
    - v. The Grantee will procure any easements from any private property owners necessary to complete the Projects.
    - vi. The Grantee agrees to take "before and after" photographs of the Project and shall provide copies of all photographs to the County as part of Grantee's application for payment.
    - vii. The Grantee shall arrange for a tour of the Project area with County officials within forty-five days (45) days of completion of the project.
    - viii. The Grantee agrees to acknowledge the County's financial support for the Projects. Any statement, press release, bid, solicitation, or other document issued describing the Project shall provide information reflecting that County funds were used to support the Project and will contain the following language:

"This Project is made possible in part by a grant provided by the County of Oneida, through an appropriation made by the Oneida County Board of Legislators, upon a request of the Oneida County Executive, Anthony J. Picente, Jr. "Any site developed or improved by the Project shall display a sign, in a form approved by the County, stating the same information.

C. Upon the completion of each Project, the Grantee shall submit an application for payment to the County setting forth the work performed, and the amounts expended on the Project by the Grantee. Such amounts shall include actual expenditures by the Grantee and may include in-kind services performed by the Grantee (Credit for in-kind services by the Grantee require that proper documentation of the in-kind services is provided to and approved by the County. Intent to use in-kind services must be declared at the time of application for a Project and must have been approved by the County prior to the approval of the Project). Application for payment must be received by the County within sixty (60) days after the completion of the Project or the expiration of this Grant as set forth below, whichever occurs first. Applications for payment received after that date will not be eligible for reimbursement. The County's authorized representative has final approval authority for acceptance of the Grantee's payment application. The County shall

determine whether the expenditures submitted in the payment application are consistent with the Project application and are eligible for reimbursement under this Grant. The County will verify the total amount expended by the Grantee on each Project. The verification of the amount expended shall be used by the County to calculate the Grant payment to be made by the County to the Grantee for each Project. No Grant payment shall be made to the Grantee by the County in excess of fifty percent (50%) of the total amount expended on any one Project with the total amount of grant funds to be awarded to the Grantee not to one eleventh of the Five-million Dollars allocated to the Program, unless excess grant funds are available pursuant to sub-paragraph D below. The Grantee shall not receive credit for work found by the County, in its sole discretion, to be unsatisfactory, or performed in violation of federal, state, or local law, ordinance, rule, or regulation. Upon the review and confirmation of the payment application, the County shall remit to the Grantee that amount of the Grant verified by the County in the review of the Grantee's payment application.

- D. In the event any Project is not completed or is completed for less than the cost projected by the Grantee, the County shall retain or adjust the amount of the Grant, as the circumstances dictate. The County may in its sole discretion reallocate such unused or underutilized Grant funds to other Projects of the Grantee or to other municipal projects in the Grant Program.
- 2. TERMINATION. This Agreement may be terminated upon notification by the Grantee that the Grantee no longer wishes to proceed with the Project.
- 3. NOTICE. Any notice which any party may desire or is required at any time to give or have served upon another may be delivered personally, or be sent by United States mail, postage prepaid, addressed to the representatives identified in this section, or to such other individuals at such addresses as shall have been last furnished in writing by one party to the other.

- 4. ACCOUNTING AND AUDIT. The Grantee shall maintain books, records, documents, and other evidence pertaining to the costs and expenses of implementing this Grant to the extent and in such detail that will accurately reflect the total cost of each Project. The Grantee shall use generally accepted accounting principles. All records shall be retained for five (5) years after completion of the Project. The County or its representatives shall have the right to examine books, records, documents, and other evidence and accounting procedures and practices relevant to the Grant.
- 5. INDEMNIFICATION. To the fullest extent permitted by applicable law, the Grantee (the "Indemnifying Party") shall indemnify and hold harmless, and at the County's option, defend, the County, and/or its officers, directors, members, agents, employees, contractors and other representatives (each, individually, an "Indemnified Party" and, collectively, the "Indemnified Parties"), from and against any and all liabilities, damages, losses, costs, expenses (including, without limitation, any and all reasonable attorneys' fees and disbursements), causes of action, suits, liens, claims, damages, penalties, obligations, demands or judgments of any nature, including, without limitation, for death, personal injury and property damage, economic damage, and claims brought by third parties for personal injury and/or property damage (collectively, "Damages"), incurred by any Indemnified Party caused by any negligent act or omission, or intentional misconduct of the Indemnifying Party, its officers, agents, employees (including Grantee's authorized personnel) arising out of or in connection with this Agreement.

### 6. INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS

- A. The Grantee shall purchase and maintain insurance of the following types of coverage and limits of liability with an insurance carrier qualified and admitted to doing business in the State of New York. The insurance carrier must have at least an A- (excellent) rating by A. M. Best.
  - 1. Commercial General Liability (CGL) coverage with limits of insurance of not less than \$1,000,000 each occurrence and \$3,000,000 annual aggregate.
    - a. CGL coverage shall be written on ISO occurrence form CG 00 01 1001 or a substitute form providing equivalent coverage and shall cover liability arising from premises, operations, independent contracts, products-completed operations, and personal and advertising injury.
    - b. The County (for purposes of this form, specifically named as "Oneida County"), and any other parties required by the County, shall be included as additional insureds. Coverage for the additional insureds shall apply as primary and non-contributing insurance before any other insurance or self-insurance, including any deductible or self-insured retention, maintained by or provided to the additional insureds.

- 2. Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability
  - a. Statutory limits apply.

### 3. Automobile Liability

- a. Business auto liability with limits of at least \$1,000,000 for each accident.
- b. Business auto coverage must include coverage for liability arising out of all owned, leased, hired, and non-owned automobiles.
- c. The County (for purposes of this form, specifically named as "Oneida County"), and any other parties required by the County, shall be included as additional insureds on the auto policy. Coverage for these additional insureds shall be on a primary and non-contributing basis.

### 4. Commercial Umbrella

- a. Umbrella limits must be not less than \$1,000,000 for each occurrence and \$3,000,000 annual aggregate.
- b. Umbrella coverage must include as additional insureds all entities that are additional insureds on the CGL.
- c. Umbrella coverage for such additional insureds shall apply as primary and noncontributing insurance before any other insurance or self-insurance, including any deductible or self-insured retention, maintained by or provided to the additional insureds.
- B. Waiver of Subrogation: the Grantee waives all rights against the County and their agents, officers, directors, and employees for recovery of damages to the extent these damages are covered by CGL or Workers' Compensation and Employer's Liability insurance maintained per requirements stated above.
- C. Certificates of Insurance: Prior to the start of any work, the Grantee shall provide certificates of insurance to the County. Attached to each certificate of insurance shall be a copy of the additional insured endorsement that is part of the Grantee's CGL policy. These certificates and the insurance policies required above shall contain a provision that coverage afforded under the policies will not be canceled or allowed to expire until at least thirty (30) days prior to written notice has been given to the County.
- 7. CHOICE OF LAW. This Agreement shall be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of New York, exclusive of its choice of laws, rules, and principles. The parties agree that any legal action shall be filed in a court of competent jurisdiction in Oneida County, New York.
- 8. TERM.

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- A. EFFECTIVE DATE: This Grant shall become legally effective upon such date as this Agreement is executed by both parties and shall remain in effect retroactively from February 10, 2022, until December 31, 2026, or until all obligations set forth in this Grant have been satisfactorily fulfilled, whichever occurs first.
- B. TERMINATION: This Grant may be terminated by the County or the Grantee at any time with or without cause upon thirty (30) days written notice to the other parties.
- 9. ASSIGNMENT: The Grantee shall neither assign nor transfer any rights or obligations under this agreement without the prior written consent of the County.
- 10. EXECUTORY NATURE OF AGREEMENT. It is understood and agreed by all parties, that this Grant is funded through the Grant Program, and if, at any time, the Grant Program terminates, Program funds become unavailable or are exhausted, or the Grant Program expires through an act of law or otherwise, the funding for this Agreement shall likewise terminate. Should the Grant Program expire or the Grant Program funding becomes unavailable, the County shall be under no obligation to make any payments under this Agreement. All parties' obligations to the others under this Agreement shall terminate, effective immediately, upon notification of the termination of the Grant Program or the unavailability of the Grant Funds.

### 11. ENTIRE AGREEMENT:

- A. The terms of this Agreement, including any attachments, amendments, addendums, or appendixes attached hereto, constitute the entire understanding and agreement of the parties and cancel and supersede all prior negotiations, representations, understandings, or agreements, whether written or oral, with respect to the subject matter of this Agreement. By signing below, the parties agree and acknowledge that they have read, understood, and agree to all the terms contained in any addenda attached hereto, including, but not limited to, Addendum I (Standard Oneida County Conditions).
- B. No waiver, alterations, or modifications of and provisions of this Agreement shall be binding unless in writing and signed by the duly authorized representative of the parties sought to be bound.


