

#### **MEMORANDUM**

**RE:** Regional Demolition Program

As we have worked with local governments for over 30 years, we recognize the significant cost of demolishing abandoned, dilapidated structures. In 2007, the Authority started a program to help local governments with their efforts to clean up these deteriorating structures. We are again offering this program to make available a demolition crew (including equipment) to demolish abandoned structures owned by a municipality. The crew will come from the Authority landfill facility. The program is limited to the four winter months (December through March) when waste volumes are the lowest. The Authority will not charge for the demolition crew and equipment. Costs to the municipality will be for the transportation and disposal of the demolition debris which must be landfilled. We would also ask municipalities to assist with dust suppression as needed, securing and fencing site, disconnecting and capping utilities, and completing backfill. In deciding which structures to demolish, we will consider the condition, location, and coordination of the required equipment.

The following guidelines have been established for the program:

- Demolitions must be done in the December to March timeframe.
- 2. Only structures owned by the county, town, village, or city are eligible.
- 3. The program is intended primarily for wood framed residential structures. Other structures may be considered by the Authority. If a demolition requires additional equipment, other arrangements may have to be made by the municipality.
- 4. Prior compliance with asbestos survey and abatement per NYS Department of Labor Industrial Code Rule 56 will be required. Structures that have been condemned due to being structurally unsound that would require the demolition of the structure with asbestos in place will not be eligible for this program.
- 5. Applications must be submitted no later than October 31st. The application form is enclosed.

MEMORIALIZING PETITION URGING GOVERNOR HOCHUL TO SIGN LEGISLATION TO ENSURE THAT RESPONDING AMBULANCE SERVICE COMPANIES RECEIVE DIRECT PAYMENT FOR ALL EMERGENCY TRANSPORTS

Sponsor: Mme. Pratt, Messrs. Flisnik, Waterman, Buck

WHEREAS, ambulance service providers play a vital role in public health and safety services across New York state, and

WHEREAS, the constant and prompt availability of ambulance response is something that all of our citizens have grown accustomed to and it is essential to the survivability of all New Yorkers when there is a medical crisis, and

WHEREAS, fair and direct reimbursement for those services is paramount to the financial stability and continued availability of ambulances to respond, and

WHEREAS, ambulance services in the state treat and transport anyone, regardless of insurance or ability to pay, but when the provider isn't a member of the patient's insurance network, the patient is paid directly instead of the ambulance agency, and

WHEREAS, emergency medical services providers too often are not paid by patients for ambulance transportation even though they receive payment from the insurance company, and

WHEREAS, too many of those patients never pay the ambulance providers, weakening the emergency medical services system, and

WHEREAS, it is time health insurance companies pay providers what they are owed without burdening patients, and

WHEREAS, the "direct pay" legislation (S.1466/A.250) passed by the State Legislature streamlines the process by which ambulance service providers are reimbursed by health insurers by allowing for health insurers to send payments directly to ambulance providers, and

WHEREAS, this legislation will assure that responding ambulance service will receive direct payment for all ambulance service transports upon submission of an invoice to the insurance company without the need for the responding ambulance company to be a preferred provider, and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, the Oneida County Board of Legislators urges Governor Kathy Hocul to sign the "direct pay" legislation to ensure ambulance service providers receive the critical financial resources needed to continue doing their jobs safely and effectively, delivering the best possible outcomes for patients across New York state, and

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED**, that a copy of this resolution be sent to Governor Kathy Hochul, State Senators Joseph A. Griffo and Rachel May, State Assembly members Marianne Buttenschon, Brian D. Miller, Kenneth Blankenbush and Robert Smullen, and others deemed appropriate.

WAYS & MEANS

Cyber security remains the top of the Information Technology Department. We are always evaluating our capabilities and looking for ways to improve our defenses against cyber-attacks. One way we can do this is to improve upon our Security Operations Center (SOC).

Our current SOC has been a tremendous asset to Oneida County however it does have limitations. The SOC is currently staffed M-F 8 a.m. – 5 p.m. with on-call support available outside normal hours of operation. Since cyber-attacks can happen at any time of day, it is critical we have 24 x 7 support.

New York State Information Technology and Division of Homeland Security have partnered to create the Joint Security Operations Center (JSOC). This service is being offered at no cost to County governments. The service includes free end point protection, 24 X 7 monitoring, and response when potential cyber-attacks are detected. The term of this agreement is 3 years.

Participation in this program, will bolster our defenses and improve response time by allowing the JSOC cyber team a centralized view of threat data across the State. Since this program is being offered free of charge, the County can realize an estimated annual savings of \$180,000.

I have included for your review the Intergovernmental Agreement that outlines this program. If the enclosed agreement meets your approval, I respectfully request this proposal be forwarded to the Board of Legislators for consideration.

Enclosed is the Staff Sergeant Parker Gordon Fox Suicide Prevention Grant Program Grant Agreement for a Renewal Award, which sets forth Oneida County's desire to continue with the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs suicide prevention program for another year. The County is required to sign the Agreement for Renewal Award before it can be reviewed by the Board of Legislators. If the County is approved for another year, the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs will award our office an amount up to \$750,000.00. Funds will be used by the Mental Health Department to contract with providers to meet the needs of eligible veterans and their families through outreach, provision or coordination of suicide prevention services, and connection to the Veterans Affairs and community resources.

The renewal grant period will be from September 30, 2023, through September 30, 2024. Matching funds are not required.

Having received special permission from the Oneida County Board of Legislators for you to execute this Agreement for Renewal Award in order to meet the deadline we were given to commit to a renewal year of the program, I request that you execute the document and forward it to the Oneida County Board of Legislators for their review and approval. Attached is a five-year grant between Oneida County through its Health Department and the New York State Department of Health for an Immunization Action Plan for vaccine preventable disease.

The New York State Department of Health is contracting with Oneida County under contract (DOH01-C38456GG-3450000) to conduct assessment, outreach, and education activities to increase pediatric and adult immunization rates to reduce the occurrence of vaccine preventable disease (VPD).

This agreement is for a NYSDOH approved budget and work plan for a five-year agreement. The fiveyear term runs from April 1, 2023, through March 31, 2028. The total five-year reimbursement amount is \$575,685.00 (\$115,137.00 per fiscal year).

As part of the reorganization plan presented by Colleen Fahy-Box, Commissioner of Social Services, the Department of Family and Community Services wishes to adopt a new title for promotional opportunities within the Veterans Services Division. To that end, working with the Department, I have added the title Senior Veterans Service Officer to the Oneida County Civil Service Classification Plan. I have attached the job specification for the title that outlines the duties and responsibilities for the position.

I recommend that the salary for Senior Veterans Service Officer be set at Grade 30W, Step 4, starting at \$51,569.

I am not requesting that any additional positions be created at this time. The Department has submitted the necessary form to my office to reclassify an existing vacant position to this title once adopted. To that end, I am requesting that position number 6011-572 be transferred to cost center 6510 to effectuate this reorganization for the Department.

### **SENIOR VETERANS SERVICE OFFICER**

DISTINGUISHING FEATURES OF THE CLASS: This position involves responsibility for case coordination, counseling, and processing of claims for veterans and their dependents. The incumbent is responsible for exercising sound professional judgement and knowledge in the processing of claims, completing interviews and assessments to discern needs of the veteran, and making referrals for veterans as deemed necessary. The functional duties are like those of a Veterans Service Officer, except that through training and experience, the Senior Veterans Service Officer has gained the expertise to handle more complex issues with less direct supervision and apply more independent judgment. Supervision may be exercised over Veterans Service Officers, and other subordinate staff in the absence of or at the request of the Director. The work is performed under the general supervision of the Director of Veterans Services. The incumbent performs related work as required.

### **TYPICAL WORK ACTIVITIES:** (Illustrative Only)

Interpret and apply the state and federal regulations and policies pertaining to Veteran Services, including Title 38;

Provide coordination of services between the Veterans Service Agency and various County agencies and with various community-based agencies;

Assists veterans and their families with accessing benefits such as pensions, disabilities, educational benefits, health benefits, insurance and counseling;

Counsels families of deceased veterans including, burial arrangements, Social Security benefits, retirement pensions, life insurance payments, and survivor benefits;

Complete research and case analysis of veteran files in order to assist in the filing of application(s) for benefits;

Provide case management services on an individual basis through home visits including nursing homes and hospitals;

Preside over the federal Board of Veteran Appeals proceedings concerning veterans benefit claims;

Prepare written briefs detailing decision(s) related to administrative hearings of various veteran claims and submit for review:

Assist the Director in administering the work of the unit;

Act as a liaison to the Veterans Legal Services Program;

Assist in and/or coordinate community events honoring veterans and promote community awareness and advocacy of veteran's service and needs;

Maintains records and reports as required.

<u>FULL PERFORMANCE KNOWLEDGE, SKILLS, ABILITIES AND PERSONAL CHARACTERISTICS:</u> Thorough knowledge of the underlying principles and philosophy regarding veterans' assistance programs; thorough knowledge of Federal, State, and local veterans' assistance statutes and regulations; ability to plan, assign, and supervise the work of subordinate employees; exceptional ability to deal effectively with people; sound judgment; tact; courtesy.

### **MINIMUM QUALIFICATIONS:** Either:

- (A) Possession of Bachelor's Degree **AND** two (2) years of human services experience; **OR**
- (B) Successful completion of sixty (60) credit hours **AND** four (4) years of human services experience; **OR**
- (C) Graduation from high school or possession of a high school equivalency diploma **AND** six (6) years of human services experience.

### **SPECIAL REQUIREMENTS:**

- Candidate must be an honorably discharged wartime veteran unless the veteran is in possession of a Restoration of Honor Act Decision Letter restoring access to State benefits issued by the Division of Veterans' Services.
- 2. Possession of a valid New York State driver's license at time of appointment. License must remain valid throughout appointment.

### **NOTES:**

- 1. Degree(s) must have been awarded by a college or university accredited by a regional, national, or specialized agency recognized as an accrediting agency by the U.S. Department of Education/U.S. Secretary of Education. If the degree was awarded by an educational institution outside the United States and its territories, the candidate must provide independent verification of equivalency. Dear Commissioner,

I am requesting funding for ten DFCS positions that were unfunded in the 2023 budget.

Many positions were unfunded in the 2023 budget as the Department had difficulty hiring in various titles for many reasons including the impact of the pandemic, salaries not commensurate with responsibility, and delays in civil service testing since 2020. While the department requested the positions be posted and actively recruited and interviewed, often the efforts were not successful. Due to concern regarding significant vacancies and the difficulty hiring, DFCS administration conducted an extensive assessment of the department's workforce that included a review of the tasks for all positions, analysis of projected caseload size as related to capacity and staffing, each divisions structure and program accountability, and pay grades for titles compared to other positions of similar title and responsibility for counties of similar size and/or demographics, as well as private sector titles of similar nature. Based on the review, a proposal was forwarded to the County Executive and reviewed by your department that eliminated 30 positions, recommended pay upgrades for the DFCS specific titles, and requested the remaining unfunded positions be funded as able to hire, in the hopes recruitment would be improved as the result of the DFCS restructure plan. This plan was approved at the June 14, 2023 Board of Legislators meeting.

I am pleased to report positive results in the efforts to improve recruitment and retention which has resulted in more applicants. Post pandemic the civil service tests are being scheduled timelier as well as the exam results. Together this has resulted in individuals willing to accept positions that previously were difficult to fill. As the department continues its recruitment efforts, I am hopeful there will be continued success in hiring. Many of the positions that remain unfunded are critical to department operations as explained in my letter dated June 7, 2023 submitted to the Board as part of the docket requesting the upgrades for DFCS titles.

The ten positions include:

Child Support Division (6010):

Child Support Assistant Supervisor Pos.#49

The child support investigator series has been at an approximate 40% deficit in staffing for several years. These positions are needed to complete the work required as per regulation and policy. This work provides tremendous benefit to many families and supports efforts to reduce the number of families receiving public assistance.

### Resource Division (6010):

Social Services Investigator Pos. #183

Social Services Investigator Pos. # 542

Sr. Social Services Investigator Pos. # 185

Sr. Resource Investigator Pos. # 395

Please note: In the restructure plan the Resource Investigator and Sr. Resource Investigator titles were determined to be unnecessary in current operations, and therefore, declared obsolete from the Oneida County Classification Plan. Two of these three titles were eliminated however, the plan was to reclass one to the position of Sr. Social Services Investigator. Upon approval of the refunding of Sr. Resource Investigator Pos. #395, the position will be reclassed to Sr. Social Services Investigator.

Resource Division is responsible for fraud detection and investigation, recoupment and liens, collections, indigent burials, conducting NYS Inspector General investigation and agency complaint reviews, and many other important tasks. This division ensures program integrity in all the DSS public benefit programs. The Resource division has also been working at approximately half staff since the pandemic. Failing to complete these job duties results in loss of revenue and reimbursement for the County.

#### Medical Division (6013):

Chief Social Welfare Examiner Pos. #166

In the restructure plan it was recommended to move this position to the Income Maintenance Division (6012) to manage the Rome Services Office. This has been an identified need and as the Medicaid staffing has decreased the need for this position in that division is no longer required. The Rome Office manages approximately 40% of the Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance (OTDA) Income Maintenance related programs as well as the homeless cases in that area of the county. The office needs administrative oversight at a higher level than currently exists.

I respectfully ask that these positions be refunded. I am available for any questions or discussion.

RE: Request to Create two (2) New Positions – Sentencing Mitigation Specialists

Dear Commissioner Cortese-Kolasz:

I would like to create two (2) Sentencing Mitigation Specialists for the Public Defender — Criminal office. A sentencing mitigation specialist compiles a comprehensive and well-documented psycho-social history of a client based on an investigation of that client's entire life leading to their arrest. They analyze the significance of the information received in terms of impact on development, including effect on personality and behavior; work closely with or identifies a need for expert assistance; provide social history information to experts to enable them to conduct competent and reliable evaluations; and, they work with the defense team and experts to develop a comprehensive and cohesive report that defense counsel can utilize to present reasons for mitigation to get a more appropriate offer from the prosecution, or when sentencing a client.

Our sentencing mitigation specialists do not do the same work as our forensic mitigation specialists, but they will work closely with our forensic mitigation specialists and attorneys when additional background information about the client, the client's family and the client's upbringing directly impact the client's reasons for being in the criminal justice system. Like the forensic mitigation specialists, the sentencing mitigation specialists will play an important role in maintaining close contact with the client and his/her family while the case is pending. Please note that often times, the rapport developed in this mitigation process can be the key to persuading a client to accept a plea or go to trial. But, overall, having a sentencing mitigation specialist work as part of the defense team enhances our client-centered representation ensuring that every client is provided with the best representation possible.

Oneida County does not have sentencing mitigation specialists in any other department. However, the level of education and experience required to perform the job duties should be a sliding educational scale. In other words, the ideal applicant should have the following education and experience to apply:

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- Master's Degree with one (1) year of experience in counseling, law enforcement, juvenile or criminal justice, corrections, community corrections, probation/parole, social services, mental health, social work or other public or private human services agency; OR
- Bachelor's Degree with three (3) years of experience in counseling, law enforcement, juvenile or criminal justice, corrections, community corrections, probation/parole, social services, mental health, social work or other public or private human services agency; OR
- Associates Degree with five (5) years of experience in counseling, law enforcement, juvenile or criminal justice, corrections, community corrections, probation/parole, social services, mental health, social work or other public or private human services agency.

Looking at Job titles, in the County, that are similar, but not exact, I found that this position, although akin to our Forensic Evaluation Specialists, does not require the applicant to have a special license (e.g., CASAC) which also requires yearly training to maintain a license, thus the Sentencing Mitigation specialist is not at the same "level" as the Forensic Evaluation Specialist. However, similar to the Sr. Confidential Investigator, this applicant would require a special skill set (exceptional interviewing, interpersonal, investigative and writing skills) but not necessarily within one field (e.g., law enforcement) of experience. Thus, it is my opinion that this title — Sentencing Mitigation Specialist — should be similarly categorized as a 32W (starting salary \$55, 198).

I respectfully request, if approved, that this position be created in the OILS Hurrell-Harring Cost Center (1174) which is fully reimbursed by New York State. These titles were created in the Year 4 and Year 5 ILS contract, which, once finalized and signed by all parties and then created by Oneida County, will be 100% reimbursed by the State.

I am happy to provide any additional information about this title and my research into this type of position including a sample mitigation report. I feel that the addition of this position would greatly enhance the quality of representation that our clients receive while also assisting the attorneys with negotiating for fair dispositions. If this meets with your approval, can you please forward the request to the County Executive for his approval and to the Board of Legislators for their approval? Thank you for your time and consideration.

### **SENTENCING MITIGATION SPECIALIST**

<u>DISTINGUISHING FEATURES OF THE CLASS</u>: The work involves responsibility for routine case management, investigation and mitigation work that requires the application of social work skills. The incumbent works as part of a multi-disciplinary legal defense team to develop mitigation strategies that influence client-centered resolution of pending criminal cases. The incumbent performs difficult, complex and sensitive professional level case management and investigative work to support Assistant Public Defenders in effectively representing clients. Dear County Executive Picente,

Attached is a proposed amendment to a reimbursable grant from the New York State Division of Criminal Justice Services concerning the County's Domicile Restriction Program (Alternatives to Incarceration). This amendment (i) extends the term of the original grant from July 1, 2023 to June 30, 2024. and (ii) provides reimbursement up to \$42,594.00 for expenses incurred by our Domicile Restriction Program during the amended term.

As you know, the Domicile Restriction Program provides alternatives to incarceration at the pre-trial and post-sentencing stages of the legal process, and allows defendants the opportunity to live at home, work and seek treatment instead of being incarcerated. This program is a graduated sanction of probation and utilized for both adults and juveniles. In 2022 the program replaced 10,994 days of incarceration at the Oneida County Jail and 2833 days of secure or non-secure detention of juveniles, for a total savings to the County of approximately 2.7 million dollars.

Assuming this amendment meets with your approval, please forward same to the Board of Legislators for its review and approval.

- 1.) Narrative Description of Proposed Services: This grant assists in funding the Domicile Restriction Program which provides alternatives to incarceration at the pre-trial and post-sentencing stages of the legal process.
- 2.) Program/Service Objectives and Outcomes: The program allows employed criminal defendants to continue working. In 2022, the program replaced 10,994 days of incarceration at the Oneida County Jail, a savings of \$90.00 per day for a total savings of \$989,460.00. The program also replaced 2,833 days of secure or non-secure detention for juveniles, saving the County \$1,723,518.83. The total dollar amount saved for the County through the Domicile Restriction Program is \$2,712,978.83.
- 3.) Program Design and Staffing: Two Probation Officers and one Probation Assistant install and monitor equipment and report compliance/violations to the Court.



A LOCAL LAW OF THE COUNTY OF ONEIDA PROVIDING REAL PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTIONS FOR VOLUNTEER FIREFIGHTERS AND AMBULANCE WORKERS PURSUANT TO SECTION 466-A OF THE REAL PROPERTY TAX LAW

BE IT ENACTED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY LEGISLATORS OF THE COUNTY OF ONEIDA, STATE OF NEW YORK, AS FOLLOWS:

#### SECTION 1. LEGISLATIVE INTENT AND PURPOSE.

- a. The Oneida County Legislature finds it appropriate to recognize the service and dedication of volunteer firefighters and volunteer ambulance company members. Furthermore, the Oneida County Legislature determines that attracting and retaining quality volunteer firefighters and emergency medical personnel is one of the most critical problems facing a number of communities in Oneida County and that maintaining effective emergency protection depends on the ability to train and retain volunteers.
- b. The Legislature finds and determines that it is essential for the County to provide a real property tax exemption as an incentive to attract new volunteers and help combat a persistent and alarming decline in the number of volunteers serving as active responders to fire and medical emergencies and unless recruits are found to replace retiring volunteers and seasoned members are encouraged to continue their volunteer service, the health and safety of citizens served by the volunteer firefighter and emergency medical personnel corps may be jeopardized.
- c. The Legislature further finds and determines that a real property tax exemption is an appropriate way to recognize the personal sacrifices and dedication of these community-spirited men and women who unselfishly give their time and risk their safety to protect their neighbors without compensation.
- d. The purpose of this Local Law is to adopt the real property tax exemption provided for volunteer firefighters and emergency medical personnel in accordance with Section 466-a of the Real Property Tax Law to read as follows.

#### SECTION 2. REAL PROPERTY TAX EXEMPTION.

Real property owned by an enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service or such enrolled member and spouse residing in the County of Oneida shall be exempt from taxation to the extent of 10 percent of the assessed value of such property for County purposes, exclusive of special assessments.

#### SECTION 3. QUALIFICATIONS.

Such exemption shall only be granted to an enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance services in Oneida County if:

- (a) the applicant resides in the County of Oneida and resides in the city, town or village, which is served by the incorporated volunteer fire company or fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service; and
- (b) the real property which is the subject of such exemption is the primary residence of the applicant; and
- (c) the real property is used exclusively for residential purposes; provided however, that in the event any portion of such property is not used exclusively for the applicant's residence but is used for other purposes, such portion shall be subject to taxation and the remaining portion only shall be entitled to the exemption provided by this Local Law; and
- (d) the applicant has obtained and displayed a certificate issued by the authority having jurisdiction for the incorporated volunteer fire company or fire department indicating that the applicant has been an enrolled active member of such incorporated volunteer fire company or fire department for at least two years or the applicant has been certified by the authority having jurisdiction for the incorporated voluntary ambulance service as an enrolled active member of such incorporated voluntary ambulance service for at least two years and the applicant otherwise would be eligible for a service award program using the criteria for such service awards programs set forth in in Sections 217 and 219-e of the General Municipal Law, which criteria are incorporated into this local law and are specifically made applicable to both volunteer firefighters and volunteer ambulance workers; and
- (e) the incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated volunteer ambulance service has submitted to the Oneida County Director of Emergency Services a complete list of enrolled members, with their respective dates of service with such incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated volunteer ambulance service. The Oneida County Director of Emergency Services shall than review all applicants and certify those applicants who meet the necessary criteria to be eligible for this exemption.

#### SECTION 4. TWENTY YEAR ACTIVE MEMBERS.

Any enrolled member of an incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service who accrues more than twenty years of active service

and is so certified by the authority having jurisdiction for the incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service, shall be granted the ten percent exemption as authorized by this section for the remainder of his or her life as long as his or her primary residence is located within the County of Oneida.

### SECTION 5. UN-REMARRIED SURVIVING SPOUSES OF VOLUNTEERS KILLED IN THE LINE OF DUTY.

An un-remarried spouse of a volunteer firefighter(s) or volunteer ambulance worker(s) killed in the line of duty may receive the real property tax exemption if:

- 1. Such un-remarried spouse is certified by the authority having jurisdiction for the incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service as an unremarried spouse of an enrolled member of such incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated volunteer ambulance service who was killed in the line of duty; and
- 2. Such deceased volunteer had been an enrolled member for at least five years; and
- 3. Such deceased volunteer had been receiving the exemption prior to his or her death.

### SECTION 6. UN-REMARRIED SURVIVING SPOUSES OF VOLUNTEERS WITH AT LEAST TWENTY YEARS OF SERVICE.

An un-remarried spouse of a volunteer firefighter(s) or volunteer ambulance worker(s) with twenty years of service may receive the real property tax exemption if:

- 1. Such un-remarried spouse is certified by the authority having jurisdiction for the incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated voluntary ambulance service as an unremarried spouse of a deceased enrolled member of such incorporated volunteer fire company, fire department or incorporated volunteer ambulance; and
- 2. Such deceased volunteer had been an enrolled member for at least twenty years; and
- 3. Such deceased volunteer and un-remarried spouse had been receiving the exemption of such property prior to the death of such volunteer.

#### SECTION 7. APPLICATION PROCESS.

- 1. Applications for such exemption shall be filed annually with the assessor of the city, village or town on or before the taxable status date on a form as prescribed by the New York State Commissioner for the Office of Real Property Tax Services.
- 2. The assessor of the city, village or town shall have the duty and responsibility of procuring and filing a copy of such certification prior to granting the exemption provided for by this Local Law.

#### SECTION 8. NO DIMINUTION OF CURRENT BENEFITS.

No applicant who is a volunteer firefighter or volunteer ambulance worker who by reason of such status is receiving any benefit under the provisions of law on the effective date of this Local Law shall suffer any diminution of such benefit because of the provisions of this Local Law.

### SECTION 9. EFFECTIVE DATE.

This Local Law shall be effective upon its filing with the New York State Secretary of State in accordance with Section 27 of the Municipal Home Rule Law and shall apply to assessment rolls prepared on the basis of taxable status dates occurring on or after such date.

The Oneida-Herkimer Solid Waste Management Authority ("Authority") operates a Food2Energy facility at its Eastern Transfer Station ("Facility"), immediately adjacent to the Oneida County Water Pollution Control Plant ("WPCP"). The Facility receives organic food waste from businesses and institutions including food waste delivered pursuant to New York's Food Donation and Food Scraps Recycling Law. It creates a food waste slurry that is piped through a buried force main to the WPCP, where it is processed through a mechanical screening device, and the resulting screened product is introduced to the WPCP's anaerobic digesters, which break down the food waste slurry into biogas which is used to generate energy that is utilized entirely at the WPCP.

Efficient operation of the force main is essential to the Authority's operations, however, the force main frequently clogs, creating downtime in the operations of both the Facility and the WPCP. The County and the Authority staff have been working together to improve operations.

In conjunction with the ongoing upgrades at the WPCP, new screening equipment is scheduled for installation to improve the processing of food waste slurry. In coordination with the Authority, we have determined that the most efficient location for the placement of this equipment is at the Authority's Food2Energy facility. This will improve the operational efficiency of the system while decreasing the clogging of the food waste force main, both which will benefit the County and the Authority.

In order to install equipment purchased by the County on Authority property, a lease agreement ("Agreement"), made pursuant to General Municipal Law Section 99-r, has been prepared. The New York State Environmental Facilities Corporation ("NYSEFC"), the agency funding this work, has approved the terms and conditions of the

Oneida County currently procures electric utility service from Constellation NewEnergy, Inc. through a public bid conducted by Genesee County and managed by the Municipal Electric and Gas Alliance (MEGA Contract). MEGA serves more than 300 municipalities and private businesses in upstate New York, and through aggregated utility procurement, via competitive bid, offers very competitive pricing. Our current contracts expire in November 2023.

The Department of Public Works has performed an evaluation of alternative procurement methods and utilization of the MEGA Contract appears to be the most cost competitive and efficient option that complies with New York State General Municipal Law. Due to the complexities, unique nature, and regulations associated with the electric utility market, conducting an independent bid would require the services of a professional consultant. Consulting services would potentially add significant cost to the bid and results are likely to be similar to, or greater than, pricing established in the MEGA Contract.

Fixed firm rates versus variable rates were evaluated. Fixed firm rates provide stable and predictable expenditures which is crucial for budgeting purposes. Therefore, I recommend taking advantage of the fixed firm rates. Note, this pricing will be updated before the Board meeting to reflect current market prices.

I recommend approval and execution of the enclosed contracts with Constellation NewEnergy, Inc. for Oneida County's electric utility service. Based upon the County's estimated usage and the estimated market cost at the time of execution, the estimated annual cost would be approximately \$2,000,000.00 per year, for a total estimated cost over three years of \$6,000,000.00, all subject to fluctuation. If you agree and the enclosed contracts are acceptable then please forward same to the Oneida County Board of Legislators for consideration.

1) Narrative Description of Proposed Services:

Oneida County currently procures electric utility service from Constellation NewEnergy, Inc. through "piggyback" contracts derived from a public bid conducted by Genesee County and managed by the Municipal Gas and Electric Alliance (MEGA). MEGA serves more than 300 municipalities and private businesses in upstate New York, and through aggregated utility procurement via competitive bid, offers very competitive pricing. Our current contracts expire in November 2023.

There are two contracts, which split the County's accounts into two bills in order to maximize the savings to the County. The first contract is a "single bill" contract, meaning the supply and delivery charges are both billed together, and was established years ago to maximize the County's ability to capture credits generated by its solar energy facilities (grouping supply and delivery charges on one contract increase the charges on the bill and therefore allows the County to deduct its full solar credits). The second contract is a "dual bill" contract, which separates billing for supply and delivery and its electricity rate is slightly cheaper for that reason, and also because most of the contract serves the County's water pollution control plant, which uses more off-peak power and is consequently less expensive to serve.

- 2) Program/Service Objectives and Outcomes: Acceptance of these contracts will result in significant cost saving for electric utility services for Oneida County. On May 10, 2023, the Oneida County Board of Legislators approved an inter-municipal agreement between the Town of Marshall and Oneida County thereby granting Oneida County the authority to act as project sponsor. A combination of Federal, State and local funding will provide funding to reimburse the County for 100% of the costs of this project.

In accordance with the NYSDOT Procedures for Locally Administered Federal Aid Projects, Oneida County solicited an Expression of Interest (EOI) from each consulting firm on the NYSDOT Region 2 LDSA County list. Each EOI was reviewed and scored on a qualification basis. State and Federal procedures prohibit the use of consulting fees as a determining factor. It was determined that C&S Engineers, Inc., is the most qualified consultant for this project. Subsequently the Oneida County Department of Public Works negotiated a proposed contract with C&S Engineers, Inc., to prepare plans, specifications, and estimates. Construction inspection services will be added at a later date, via amendment.

I recommend award of contract H2356699 to C&S Engineers, Inc., (C&S), of Syracuse, New York in the amount of \$400,000.00 to prepare plans, specifications, and estimates for replacement of the Gridley Page Road over Big Creek in the Town of Marshall.

- 1. Approval of an Agreement between Dr. Susan Blatt and Oneida County (Contract #179036) to provide medical exams for children alleged to have been the victims of sexual assault. Dr. Blatt will conduct training in specific procedures to preforming childhood sexual abuse examinations and preforming these examinations upon request by the Department of Social Services. Re: Request for Board of Legislators' Approval to Execute Various Airport Improvement Program (AIP) Grants Awarded by the Federal Aviation Administration FAA)

Dear County Executive Picente:

As you are aware, as part of our obligations as a federally-funded airport, Oneida County has a five-year Airport Capital Improvement Plan (ACIP) in place at all times. On an annual basis, we apply for FAA grant funding for projects that appear in our ACIP in any given year. At times, the FAA awards such project with AIP funding with very little advance notice and sets short deadlines by which Oneida County must execute grant documents.

In an effort to ensure that Oneida County is able to take advantage of the maximum amount of AIP funding that is awarded to us by the FAA, I am respectfully requesting that the Board of Legislators pass a resolution giving you advance authority to execute any and all grant documents associated with the ACIP projects that we have submitted for this year's funding. To that end, I am requesting authority for you to execute grants as follows:

1. Airfield Lighting Upgrades (Design). This project will replace existing airfield lighting, signage and navigation aid equipment distributed across the airfield. Replacement equipment includes the Runway 15 PAPI (4 box, airport owned and operated), rotating beacon (located on top of the ATCT cab), approximately 50 airfield taxiway guidance signs, one primary windcone and two supplemental windcones. Only equipment will be replaced and the existing foundations, power cables, conduit will remain as-is. Isolation transformers will be replaced along with L-823 connectors and secondary power extension cord sets. All replacement equipment will be LED for a significant energy and maintenance costs savings. The existing fixture locations will not change and will generally be replaced with modern equipment of similar characteristics (height, dimensions, etc.). The total project cost is \$104,760.00, with funding sources as follows:

FAA Share \$94,284.00 County Share \$5,238.00 State Share \$5238.00 2. Apron 1 & 2 Rehabilitation (Drainage) Phase I (Construction). This project includes rehabilitation of the center portion of Apron 1 & 2 and replacement of the associated storm water trench drains. The area on each Apron is approximately 1,450 feet long by 130 feet wide for a total area of +/-42,000 SY. The total project cost, if fully funded, is \$6,369,515.00, with funding sources as follows:

FAA Share \$5,732,563.00 County Share \$318,476.00

State Share \$318,476.00

I also request that you be authorized to execute a grant agreement for a lesser amount, in the event that the FAA awards a partial or phased approach to this project.

3. Reconfigure-Reconstruct Taxiway D, H, G Intersection (Design). This project is necessary to comply with the Airport Design Advisory Circular. The taxiway D-H-G intersection will be reconfigured to provide 90 degree turns to eliminate direct access form the Terminal Apron on to Runway 15-33 via Taxiway D. The total project cost is \$257,760.00, with funding sources as follows:

4. Zero Emissions Vehicle(s) and Infrastructure (ZEV). This project would fund the purchase of two electric pickup trucks and two chargers. The total project cost is \$162,231.00, with funding sources as follows:

State Share \$8,112.00

5. Rural and Tribal Assistance Pilot Program - Airport Business Park Development - Griffiss Business & Tech Park. This project includes development of 250 acres located mid-field and west of the Runway 15 end at the Griffiss International Airport. The Business Park Development focuses on a flexible plan that can support a mix of aeronautical and non-aeronautical uses depending on demand in the Mohawk Valley Region. Significant private and public development has taken place at the Airport and associated Griffiss Business and Technology Park in recent years and demand remains strong for further development. The Airport Business Park is one of the largest undeveloped parcels remaining for commercial and industrial development in Oneida County. Oneida County would like to proceed forward with development of the site to support new development related to Unmanned Airspace Systems (UAS) testing, manufacturing, R&D, and other support facilities, as well as other aeronautical and non-aeronautical uses. The first phase of development will be to provide utilities. vehicle access by means of a road extension and traffic round- about, airport fence relocation and general site grading. The site will be prepared, including the necessary environmental and land release approvals needed so the site is shovel ready for developers. The total estimated project cost is \$868,500, with funding sources as follows:

FAA Share \$320,000
