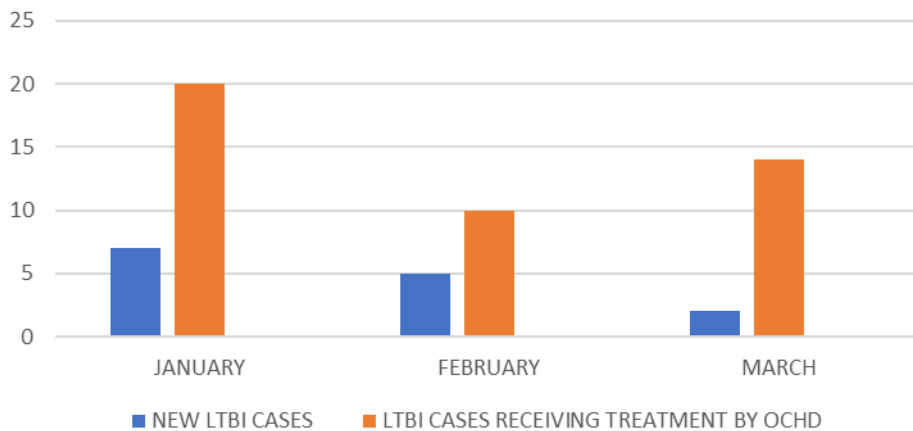

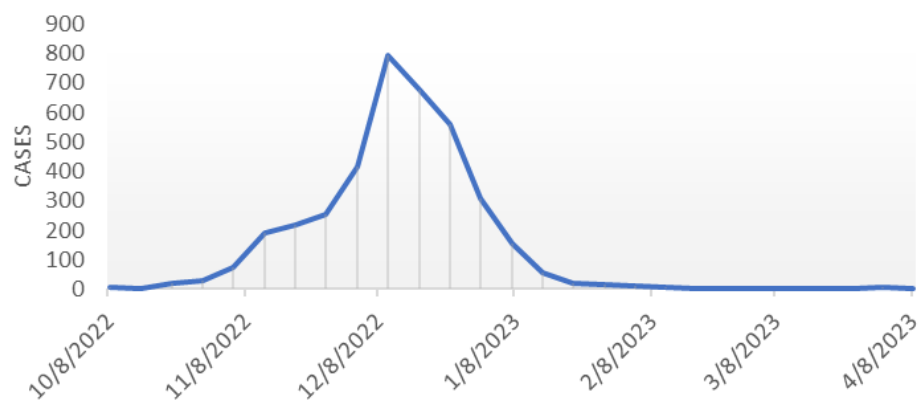

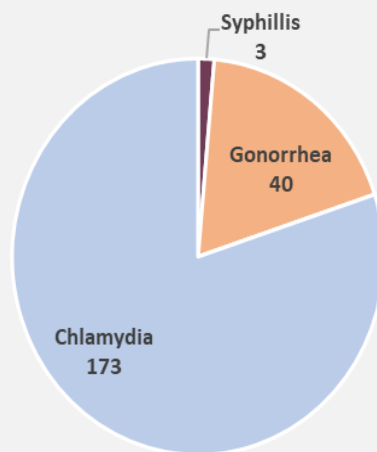

- Lyme disease
- Anaplasmosis and Ehrlichiosis
- Babesiosis
- Powassan virus disease
- Rocky Mountain spotted fever

LEAD EXPOSURE CAN OCCUR THROUGH... #BanLeadPaint

Inhalation of particles released by industry or recycling

Ingestion of contaminated soil or dust from decaying lead paint—particularly when children play on the ground and put toys or fingers in their mouths

Lead-containing products such as lead-glazed ceramics and some traditional medicines or cosmetics

Food or water contaminated with lead

There is no safe level of lead exposure

REMEMBER

NYS regulations require all medical providers to test children for lead at ages one and two AND Lead Risk Assessment Questions be asked until children turn six.
