

Measles for Health Care Providers

Healthcare providers should consider measles in patients presenting with febrile rash illness and symptoms clinically compatible with measles symptoms, especially if the person recently traveled internationally or was exposed to a person with febrile rash illness.

Healthcare providers should report suspected measles cases to their local health department immediately.

Talk to your patients about their risk of **latent TB infection.**


Extreme heat is a period of high heat and humidity with temperatures above 90 degrees for at least two to three days. In extreme heat your body works extra hard to maintain a normal temperature, which can lead to death. Extreme heat is responsible for the highest number of annual deaths among all weather-related hazards.

Older adults, children and people with certain illnesses and chronic conditions are at greater risk from extreme heat. Use <u>this guide</u> to get started in protecting your patients from hot weather.


